GALLAGHER CONFESSES

How He and Davidson Swore Away Hugh Dempsey's Liberty.

A MOST VILLAINOUS CONSPIRACY.

Both Dempsey and Beatty Entirely Innocent of Conspiracy to Polson-Gallagher Foresd to Testify Palsely by the Threats. of Pinkerton Detectivas.

Perranuse, July 15.—Patrick J. Gal-ligher and J. M. Davidson, who are serv-ing terms in the western positientiary for sell confessed complicity in the alleged poisoning of the non-union workmen in the Homestead mail, have made another confusion, in which they swear that they were paid to swear away the liberty of Hugh F. Dempsay and Robert J. Heatty, both of whom they now assert were timecent of the crime of which they were conreleted. They further state that so far as they know there was no poison adminis-tered to the men in the Homestead mill. Gallagher's confession is written by him-self and sworn to before Squire S. D. White, of Haysville, Davidson's was given rerbally in the presence of witnesses. Attorney Porter, one of Dempsey's at-torneys, has ever since the trial, been gathering evidence

in Dempsey's fa-vor. Six weeks ago he received a letter from Gallagher. asking him to cali at the penitentiary. asking him to can at the penitentiary. Mr. Porter called and in the presence of Warden Wright

and in the presence of Warden Wright and Squire White Gallagher and Davidson told their stories. Gallagher sald the secret v. Hugh Demper. killing him. He had prepared toe confession and read it to the gentlemen present, and then made affidavit to it. Davidson's and then made affidavit to it. Davidson's statements were simply a corroboration of Gallagher's. Mr. Porter this afternoon gave out the substance of the confession, suppressing only the names of the men o Gallagher says were in the plot to d Dempsey to prison. Mr. Porter read llagher's confession as follows, showing pe reporter that the paper was properly gned and attested:

"Dempsey and Beatty are entirely inne-sent. I never got any powders or poison from them, and I never administered any in the mill. I was told by Pinkerton de-rectives who arrested me that if I did not do as they wanted me to do they would indiet me for murder and have me hanged. They got me drunk and prepared a confession for me. I was kept supplied with money and whisky for forty-two days, while a detective shadowed me all the while a defective shadower me all the time. I was told that if I attempted to get away I would be shot. After the story gos into the newspapers I was given a revol-ver, and was told that I would be justified ver, and was told that I would be justified in shooting any one who molested me. They told me they were after Dempsey because the was at the head of the Knights of Labor, and that organization was no good and ought to be broken up. They haid if I would testify against Beatty and Dempsey they would not push a murder charge against me, and that I would go free. At the most I would get only staty days to satisfy the public. They continually authored me net to get mixed in my story, but to swear to what they said and tick to it. They made me rehearse the story frequently. There were other witnesses who were to take their cut from me and make their stories corroborate mine. and make their stories corroborate mine

"What Dempsey swore to was true. He bired us to make reports of the number of men in the mills. That \$25 I got from him was borrowed money, and was used to prevent my furniture being taken from Ache they would be almost priceless to those who suffer from this distressing complaint; but fortunately their goodness does not end here, and that on the case try them will find these little pills variable in so many ways that they will not be will ling to do without them. Besides these Mr. Porter has the affidavit of a person who swears that a certain detective, in the affiant's presence, told Gallagher why he wanted to send Bernsey to prison. It was because he wanted to strike a blow at the Knights of Labor. The detective also said that the only way to do it was to swear Dempsey was gullty and silck to it to the end. If he did not swear this, the distective said, he would have Gallagher indicted for murder. Similar corroboration of the con-tessions of the convicts is given by nearly a dozen witnesses whose affidavits Mr

Porter has in his possession, It will also be shown where detectives tried to get others to do some swearing in the case, and where false testimony out-side of Gallagher and Davidson, was given

Mr. Porter said: "This work was done entirely by Pinkerton detectives, probably because they wanted to get even for their defeat on July 6, and certainly without any authority." Mr. Porter thinks that because other persons connected with the case, according to Gallagher's first con-fession, were not presecuted is sufficient and conclusive evidence that the whole thing was a plot against Dempsey.
Continuing, Mr. Porter said: "From the

first I have been entirely satisfied of De sey's innocence, and, more than that, that there was never any poison administered in the Homestead mill. This is the unfortunate result of reputable people of Allegheny county importing theres and convicts from Chicago and other places and using them as detectives. 


