Stam has for many years paid tribute to China, but only as a matter of usage and convenience, and it is now apparent that China is deter mined to assist the Siamess against French enoroachiments upon their territory. The interference of China will add a most interesting feature to the Franco-Siamese dispute, and will probably result in a modification of some of the demands of France as contained in her ultimatum.

here from Bangkok states that the Siam-ese court is greatly agitated. Preparations are apparently under way for the depart-ure of the king and his court from the ure of the king and his court from the capital. Reports of the intention of the king to leave Bangkok have spread among the populace and have caused much excitement. The dispatch adds that it is stated in Bangkok that a popular agitation in favor of France has been started in the province of Battambang, some distance to the southeast of the capital, and that troops have been sent to put down that troops have been sent to put down

The statement is published that Baron Mobrenheim, the Russian ambassador to France, has officially informed the French government that Russia would support France on all points involved in the Siamese difficulty. It is further said that the Russian fleet in Chinese waters is under orders to proceed to the Gulf of Siam for the received of the content of the received of the former of t the purpose of supporting the French and of protecting the French residents in Siam. of protecting the French residents in Siam. The fleet is expected to shortly arrive in

London, July 21.—A special cabinet meeting was summoned in Downing street yesterday afternoon. There was a full attendance. France's demands in Slam were discussed at length, and eventually instructions for the Marquis of Dufferin, British ambassador to France, were formulated and appropriet. interest and approved. Immediately after the meeting the Earl of Roseberry, secretary of state of foreign affairs, communicated with the admiralty as regards the disposition of the fleet in Asiatic waters. Late in the afternoon special orders were dispatched by the admiralty to Vice Admiral Sir E. R. freemantle, commander in chief of the Chircos division of the fleet. chief of the Chinese division of the fleet. These facts, together with the sudden can-celing of the Marquis of Dufferio's leave of absence, are regarded as hardly in har-mony with the official predictions of a perfectly amicable settlement with France of the Siamese difficulty. Even if not alarmed by the course of France, the government is believed to realize that the Siamese affair is fraught with the most serious possibili-

is fraught with the most serious possibilities, for which immediate preparation
must be made by Great Britain.

BANGKOK, July 21.—The belligerent attitude of the French gunboats Comete, Inconstante and Forfait, opposite the middie of the city, is causing great anxiety
among the people. All three gunboats
have steam up and are cleared for action.
The men are continually beat to quarters,
and they train the guns on any Siamese
gunboat that happens to pass them on its
way up or down the river, day or night,
although the Siamese government enalthough the Slamese government en-deavors to ally suspicion by warning in advance the French commander of the passage of every Siamese man-of-war.

A Hit at Secretary Carlisle. TOPEKA, Kan., July 21.—The bimetallic state convention chose ex-Governor Os-borne as permanent chairman. The ad-dress preceding the resolutions, which delare against a universal gold standard, nakes this hit at Secretary Carlisle: "We indorse the opinion expressed by Hon. John G. Carlisle in 1878 that the move-ment to totally demonstize silver is a stupendous conspiracy conceived by the moneyed interests of all countries to in-croase the value of one-half of the world's metallic money by destroying the other half, and that the successful consummation of that conspiracy would be more dis-astrous to the people of this world than war, pestilence and famine."

Death of General Walker. Washington, July 21.—General John G. Walker died at his residence in this city from a stroke of paralysis. He was 70 years of age, and lived in Winchester, Va. Before the war he was captain of a company of United States cavalry, but in 1861 he resigned and went south to battle with the Confederates. He became major gen-eral of Confederate forces and was a disinguished figure in the battles of Sharps tinguished figure in the battles of Sharps-burg, Manassas and all the fights around Richmond. During Mr. Cleveland's first administration he served the government upon several special missions in South


