Director General Davis came on the platform with General St. Clair and shook hands with United States Senator Daniel, General Fitzhugh Lee, Colonel A. S. Buford, president of the Virginia World's fair board, and other prominent Virginians. Commissioners of Virginia Mrs. John S. Wise, Mrs. John Paul, the lady managers from the Old Dominion state and most of the state officials connected with the fair also faced the audience of 2,500 people. It was a typical southern gathering, as any one could tell when the stirring strains of "Dixte" fell from the lastruments of the Iowa state band. Such a spontaneous outburst of applause has not been heard in the White City since President Cleveland ressed the button on the first day of May. The leader of the band was compelled to acknowledge the compliment by calling

for the playing of a plantation melody.

Colonel A. S. Buford, a typical Virginia gentleman 76 years old, stirred up the patriotism and state pride of his audience in an historical speech and introduced General Lee, who was received with much enthusiasm. General Lee said:
"Today 65,000,000 citizens of a mighty

American republic are keeping step to the melody of the march of civil and religious melody of the march of civil and religious liberty, whose first notes were sounded beneath the sky that beams over the des-tiny of the Old Dominion. And when in her pride and glory the United States ex-ultantly finshed around the earth's elec-tric circle an invitation to all nations to come to this great city, and brought the marvelous growth of her institutions, the grand civilizations of her society and the amazing resources of states. FRED DOUGLASS AROUSED. The Colored Orator Rebukes an Attack

on His Race.
Cuicaco, Ang. 10.—Old Fred Douglass,
the colored orator, was greatly wrought
up yesterday in the suffrage congress by Stephen B. Weeks, professor of Trinity college, N. C., who read a paper on negro suffrage in the south. The professor said:
"Negro suffrage is a failure. It must re-main a failure so long as it is not an ally of the white vote. A large percentage of the southern people are of English descent. They will not submit to domination. The white man must rule and he will rule. He seeks to secure this result by fair means. He has respect for law, and for that reason seeks to rule under the law. When he cannot do that he bulldozes and counts out. No man who has not lived in a negro land knows what negro denomination is

It means the destruction of property, ruin and bankruptcy."

Douglass, who was on the platform, arose and made an impassioned reply. "You are not afraid of negro domination." e said, shaking his cane at the professor The negro can never rule this country He would be outvoted by the sixty mill ions of whites and overwhelmed by your superior intelligence. There is no opposition to the negro in the south until he aspires to rise. So long as he is ignorant and lazy no one disturbs him. If he aspires to become a lawyer or a doctor he at once becomes an upstart."

THE MUTILATION OF THE BODY.

Evidence to Show That Men Came in the Middle of the Night to Remove the Dead Man's Stomach-The Testimony of Dr. Bergen.

THENTON, Aug. 10. - Not withstanding the oppressive heat, the Shann murder trial frew another big throng of speciators to the county court house yesterday. Mrs. Shann was again surrounded by her chil-dren, married and single, and she sat much of the time with her black fan be fore her face. Her cousin, J. Watson Shann, the undertaker who had charge of the body of the deceased, under cross-ex amination testified that, after his death the youth weighed less than eighty pounds.

although he was over six feet tall.

Dr. Ellison H. Bergen testified that young Shann had kidney disease and also serious stomach trouble. The latter prevented him from retaining food, and he grew so weak in the course of a few weeks that his pulse became almost imperceptible. He vomited blood and mucus almost constantly, and he died practically from inanition. Dr Bergen read copies of all the prescriptions which he gave deceased. Dr. Bergen testified that he prescribed

Dr. Bergen testified that he prescribed corrosive sublimate tablets twice. They are bichloride of mercury and poison. They are used for disinfecting purposes, and he explained to Mrs. Shann what they were for. He made it plain that they were poisonous, and the label showed that too. John died on Tuesday, and on Thursday morning the doctor received word from Mrs. Shann about the three men disemboweling him. Mrs. Shann told him that the men came to the house between 1 and 3 o'clock in the morning. The witness examined Shann for life insurance last fall and passed him as sound.

William Beatty, who boarded with the

Witham Beatty, who boarded with the Shann's when John died, testified that he heard no noises of any kind in the house during the night that it is said the dead man's body was violated. Samuel Astley was another boarder who testified that he heard no noise of any kind in the house

Howard M. Gough, of Port Richmond, S. I., a life insurance inspector of the Man-hattan company, testified that when he first visited the Shann home after John's death his mother refused to allow him to see the remains after the mutilation of the body. However, when he went again with County Physician Cantwell and Coroner C. T. HAVICE. Coutier he was permitted to viewit. There was a large wound in the abdomen, and

the viscera was missing.
Frank C. Borden, another life insurance agent, acknowledged that he gave Mrs. Shann a tip that his company intended to investigate Joi n's death. Mrs. Eliza Blaine, an aged lady living in New Brunswick, testified that she was at the Brunswick. rick, testified that she was at the Shann ome the night John's body was mutilated. She slept in the front parlor with one of Mrs. Shann's daughters, and heard nosies during the night as though some men were walking on the stairs.


