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LOOKING TO CONGRESS.

The Business of the Nation Needs Legislative Relief.

THE NEEDLESS CURRENCY FAMINE. It is caused by the Unpopularity Attitude of Those Who Have Withdrawn Millions from the Banks for the Purpose of Hoarding It.

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly report of trade says: The long delayed meeting of congress, a presidential message which fully answered expectations, and the arrival of \$15,000,000 gold from Europe, with \$10,000,000 more on the way, have not brought the improvement many anticipated.

While statesmen consider, merchants and bankers and unemployed thousands anxiously wait, knowing that the wrecks of each passing week make the task of recovery more difficult.

The machinery of exchanges has almost stopped. When \$10 per \$1,000 is paid for New York exchanges at Chicago, and \$10 or \$20 at other western cities, settlements between the east and the west, which ordinarily amount to \$3,500,000,000 a year, become extremely difficult.

The root of the trouble is that according to reports of July 12 to the comptroller \$281,000,000 of deposits have been withdrawn in two months from part of the national banks, and probably \$177,000,000 from all banks.

The arrest of industry goes so far that a third of the iron production ceased in the month of July. The consumption of iron in manufacture diminished 46 per cent from May 1 to July 1.

It only confidence in the future could be restored the monetary troubles might soon be relieved. But at present want of cash, it is said, accounts for the retarded movement of wheat from farms to western markets, and exports have not met expectations of late, so that prices of grain have somewhat declined.

Carlisle Shoemakers on strike. CARLETON, Pa., Aug. 12.—About fifty men connected with the Carlisle shoe factory, owing to a reduction of 10 per cent of their wages, refused to work under the new scale and left the works.

Car Shops Closed Indefinitely. TOMA RIVER, N. J., Aug. 12.—The New Jersey Southern railroad car and machine shops at Manchester, employing from 300 to 400 men closed down last night for an indefinite length of time.

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THE CUP DEFENDERS.

The Race for the Goolet Cup a Spiritless Affair.

THE VIGILANT GETS THE PRIZE. The Jubilee Came in Second and the Colonia Third—The Pilgrim Met with an Accident Early in the Race and Sailed Under Disadvantages.

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 12.—The four great regattas, including the Jubilee, over the ocean course, off Bristol's Rock, it was more of a drifting match than a race, however, and the disappointment at nightfall proved equally as great as was the interest in the early morning. It showed one thing, if nothing more, that the boys of defending the American cup will be between the Vigilant and the Jubilee, for Vigilant passed over the line about twenty minutes ahead of the Jubilee.

The Colonia was lost sight of in a dense fog bank at one time, but suddenly appeared under the stern of the Vigilant at the Vineyard Sound Lightship, a training point in the triangular course. The Pilgrim met with an unfortunate accident, carrying a crew member overboard.

AGAINST MRS. SHANN. The County Physician Thinks Her Son Was Poisoned to Death.

THRENTON, Aug. 12.—The fourth day of the Shann murder trial opened with Professor Wormley, the Philadelphia toxicologist, again on the stand. He was cross-examined at length touching the nature of mercury.

Dr. Frank V. Cantwell, the county physician of Mercer county, testified regarding the investigation which he made as soon as he learned of the circumstances attending young Shann's death. It was he who made the post mortem examination and ordered the coroner's inquest. Witness said Shann's body could have been dismembered in ten minutes. The witness was required to answer many hypothetical questions, and his evidence substantially was that Shann had been dosed to death by mercurial poison.

Dr. Cantwell said that Mrs. Shann did not object to the post mortem examination, but wanted it made in her home. Whoever had mutilated the body of John Shann did it very much as a surgeon would have done it, but it was not necessarily a surgical operation. A butcher or anyone could have done the cutting. The person who removed the organs must have known considerable anatomy. There was nothing to indicate an expert hand, but a firm hand and a sharp knife were undoubtedly employed.

The court was in session only two hours this morning.

Rochnam to be Sentenced Monday. PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 12.—Recorder Smyth announced yesterday afternoon that he would sentence Dr. W. B. Shann, the wife poisoner, to death on Monday next, in the course of general sessions.
