If the alarm is sounded from box 15 the fire bell will strike one, then pause and strike five which will indicate that the fire is in the vicinity of No. 15 box. Every alarm is repeated four times.

PENNSYLVANIA DAY.

Inducements Offered By Pennsylvania Railroad Company.

The World's Fair Commission having decided on Thursday, September 7th, as the day which they desire to have formally celebrated and designated as Pennsylvania Day, the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, in pursuance of its usual custom, takes pleasure in announcing that for the benefit of those wishing to participate in or attend the ceremonies, the extremely low rate of one fare for the round trip will prevail from all points situated on the company's lines within the borders of the State.

Tickets for the occasion will be good only on the special train leaving Philadelphia at 11:30 A. M., September 8th, and reaching Lancaster at 1:15, Harrisburg 2:00, Lehigh Valley Junction 4:30, Allentown 7:00, Pittsburg 10:35 P. M. Stops will be made at intermediate stations, and connections may be made from points on the branches of the main line. The composition of the train will be first-class standard coaches, and ample accommodation will be provided for all who will avail themselves of the opportunity of showing their interest in an event so momentous as the commemoration of the Keystone State at the World's Columbian Exposition.

Chicago will be reached by the special train early in the afternoon of the next day, September 9th, and return coupons will be good for passage on trains leaving Chicago at 3:15 and 11:30 P. M. on or before September 12th.

The inducements for this excursion and the facilities provided in the train service over the Pennsylvania system, will doubtless be taken advantage of by the many Pennsylvanians who are anxious to show the pride they have for their native State.

MANY CHOLERA VICTIMS.

An Official Report of the Plague's Ravages in Russia.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 24.—A supplementary official cholera report gives the following statistics of the ravages of the disease in the affected governments during the past week: Orel, 647 new cases and 213 deaths; Cosakof of the Don, 498 new cases and 202 deaths; Kozlovsk, 296 new cases and 103 deaths; Vladimir, 156 new cases and 52 deaths; Lomza, 52 new cases and 22 deaths; Moscow, 32 new cases and 24 deaths; Viatka, 47 new cases and 22 deaths; Voronezh, 39 new cases and 22 deaths. For the past fortnight the following returns are given: Government of Padoua, 1,178 new cases and 425 deaths; government of Toul, 233 new cases and 78 deaths; government of Yaroslavl, 92 new cases and 28 deaths. In the city of Moscow during the past three days 171 new cases and 74 deaths were reported. In the city of Kertch, in the Crimea, 69 new cases and 32 deaths occurred during the past five days.

Fully Twenty-five Perished.

HALIFAX, Aug. 25.—There is no longer any doubt that fully twenty-five persons perished in the wreck of the steamer Dorcas and the large Etta Stewart. Twenty bodies have been recovered. Miss Sadie Musgrave, M. McNeill, Norman McCrory, John F. Sharp and a child of the steamer's engineer are yet unaccounted for. The schooner Dorcas Borden, coal laden for Sydney, N. S., for Bay of Fundy, capsized off Wolfville, and it is feared that all hands were lost.
