## ANOTHER MINE HORROR

Five Men Meet Death in a Colliery at Plymouth.

FIVE OTHERS SERIOUSLY INJURED.

The Tragedy Occurred Through the Care lessness of an Assistant Mine Foreman, Who Entered a Body of Gas with a Naked Lamp.

WILKINDARRE, Pa., Sept. 22.—By an exphoton of gas in the Lance colliery No. II, of the Lehigh and Wilkesburre Coal company, at Plymouth, yesterday afternoon, five men were instantly killed and five thers seriously injured.

The accident happened about 2 p. m., and was caused by Joseph Gollightly, who and was caused by resemble tenightly, who entered a body of gas with his naked lamp. A terrific explosion followed. The deadly flames swept from one end of the gangway to the other, carrying death or injury to every living being in its path. Props came tumbling down, cars were lifted off the road and dashed with fearful force arrived the cities of the card of the card of the carrying the cities and the care of the card of the card of the care of sgrainst the pillars, and loose coal was caught up and sent whirling through the chambers, only to be ground into powder by its impact with the rocky walls.

The men were working fully a thousand THERE are fewer drunken men seen feet from the spot where Golightly's lamp set off the gas, but owing to the unusually gaseous condition of the mine the scorching flame spread so rapidly that there was

> Golightly was burned fearfully, the flesh of his body being literally cooked. The other victims were not burned, but were killed by the flying debris carried on the wings of the explosion. The masons were building walls and the laborers cleaning up rubbish in the rock tunnel when death overlook them. It came with such fearful force that only a few of them had a chance to escape.
> Golightly has been assistant mine fore

nan for lifteen years and was considered one of the safest and most reliable men in the employ of the company. He was thor-oughly familiar with the mine, and why he entered the gangway with a maked lump is a mystery which none of his friends

As soon as the explosion occurred word as sent to the surface and in a few minites a thousand people had gathered at the mouth of the shaft. The greatest ex-plement prevailed among the friends of the doomed men. A rescuing party was at once organized, being led by Superin-tendent Morgan. Volunteers were ready at a moment's notice, and a large party dropped down into the shaft to bring up the victims. After a short absence they reappeared, bearing the blackened bodies, Women and children stricked in an agony of grief, and threw themselves upon the bodies of their dead as they were carried by, while strong men brushed their hardned hands across their eyes and turned

away to hide the weakness.
The damage to the mine is not extensive

MITCHELL MEANS BUSINESS

The English Pugilist Will Fight Corbett

at Coney Island in November.

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—A meeting took place last night between Judge Newton, matchmaker of the Coney Island Athletic club, and Charlie Mitchell, the English heavyweight champion, and the situation was thoroughly talked over. Mitchell said he did not propose to be ignored and be obliged to agree to whatever arrangements Corbett saw fit to arrange without his be ing consulted.

Judge Newton made him the offer of a purse of \$40,000, to which the stake money of \$10,000 a side could be added, making the purse \$60,000, the largest amount ever fought for in this country.

Mitchell said that if there was no other place to pull this light off than Coney Island, he would just as soon light it there, as the object of this trip was to fight Jim Corbett, and the quicker the matter could be settled and he could gut to training the better he would like it.


