Sincteen Were Drowned, GEORGETOWN, Del. Oct. 16.-Terrible devastation and death was wrought by the hurricane in and around this city and on the adjacent scalalands. The entire water front of Georgetown was flooded, and much damage was done to merchandise stored in warehouses. At Magnolia beach almost every home was washed away, and thirteen white and six colored people were drowned. A number escaped a watery grave by taking refuge in trees.

The Reading Raises the Wind. PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 16 .- The receivers of the Reading railroad are reported to have concluded negotiations with the Finance Company of Pennsylvania which will release certain collaterals held by the latter. This, it is believed, will enable the receivers of the Reading company to rear-range the Speyer & Co. loan of \$2,500,000 and prevent the sale by auction of the col-laterals advertised to take place this week.

NEW York, Oct. 16.-A woman who gave her name as Mrs. Lizzle Most, was taken from 256 Williams street, where she was ill with smallpox, and sent to North Brothers Island. The woman has for the past six years lived with Herr Johann Most, the anarchist, as his wife. Three other cases of smallpox were discovered in the tenenient quarter yesterday by the week health officials.



of directors, or of the executive committee of such board, if any, and accepted and approved by a majority of those present condituting a quorum. "At such meeting the person making

such application shall not be present. The said acceptance and approval shall be made by a resolution, which resolution shall be voted upon by all pre-sat at such meeting answering to their names as called, and a record of such vote shall be kept and state separately the names of all the persons voting in favor of such resolu-tion and of all persons voting against the same, and how each of such persons voted. No bank shall permit its president, its vice president, its eashier, or any of its directions, or any of its clerks, tellers, bookceepers, agents, ser-vents or other persons in its employ to become liable to it by reason of overdrawn accounts." It is also provided that a schedule of all such loans hall be reported to the comptroller of the currency.
