THE Republican party proposes, by the nomination of these two excellent candidates, to improve the *subtlest* policy of the Cleveland Administration. All their chopping and hewing will destroy, not build up, consequently there is "little difficulty in dealing with" the wool schedule, as this is to be destroyed entirely. The ruin of the wool and sugar industries, and an income tax, are the first forecasts of Free-Trade on the good old English system of low wages and a tax-burdened people.

## THE MURDERED MAYOR.

### His Body Laid to Rest in Grace-land Cemetery.

### A MONSTER FUNERAL CORTEGE.

The Body Followed to the Grave by Societies of All Nationalities, While Unorganized Citizens Swell the Ranks to Mammoth Proportions.

CHICAGO, Nov. 1.—The remains of Chicago's Garfield were borne to the City Hall yesterday, there to lie in state, during the night. Eight companies of police followed for blocks around the Carter Harrison mansion on Ashland avenue and witnessed the start. In the main it was not a fashionable multitude, but it was such a one as the famous mayor but liked to meet among and speak with. Solemn stillness was observed as eight stalwart fire-department captains emerged behind the coffin. Eight companies of police followed, marching with the fire captains the houses as full beavers. The cortege was a lengthy one, and the distance to the City Hall, two miles through the heart of the city, was not covered for a considerable time.

### TOLD THE TRUTH.

On Saturday, October 21, there was a Democratic meeting at Olmsted, Ohio. Among the speakers was L. A. Russell, a well known Democrat of strong free trade proclivities. The Democratic candidates present gave their several opinions as to the cause of the panic, and then Mr. Russell took the platform:

### Showman Bailey Extensively Robbed.

BIRMINGHAM, Conn., Nov. 1.—It is a practical certainty that the Free-punch show, of which James A. Bailey is the owner, will not again go on the road, at least in the present season. Mr. Bailey has been robbed, and the sum rifled from him is from trustworthy reports between \$50,000 and \$100,000. At least this is what Mr. Bailey asserts, and a number of arrests may be made any day.

### The Reading's Decreased Earnings.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 1.—The report of the Philadelphia and Reading railroad for the month of September and for the nine months of the current year as compared with the same periods in 1892 shows a net decrease for the month of \$127,275, and for the year a net decrease of \$874,209.10. The Philadelphia and Reading company shows a comparative decrease of \$852,280.10 for the same period.

### Five More Victims of Mine Gas.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Nov. 1.—John Graback and Michael Malchewski were killed and Patrick McTigue, Thomas George and Sherman Helfrick badly injured in an explosion of gas at the Stanton mine of the Lehigh and Wilkesbarre Coal company here. The men entered a body of gas with naked lamps, which caused a terrific explosion. The mine is badly damaged.

### After the Matabeles.

JOHANNESBURG, Nov. 1.—The Matabeles appear to have abandoned their intention to retire across the Zambezi river, it being impossible to get their cattle through the intervening country. It is now expected that the decisive fight will take place near Hope Frontals, towards which place all the available men of the British Chartered company and their native allies are pressing forward.

### The American Express Thief Arrested.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 1.—The man who is supposed to have stolen the money package sent by the American Express company from New York to New Orleans has finally been found, and is under arrest here. A. G. Guray, the money clerk of the American Express company in this city, stands charged with the theft. The amount stolen was \$22,500.

### The Murder of Captain Hedberg.

CHICAGO, Nov. 1.—An inquest over the remains of Captain Hedberg, who was shot by Lieutenant Maney, was held at Fort Sheridan yesterday. The evidence showed that the shooting was the result of a quarrel between the two, and Lieutenant Maney will be turned over to the civil authorities for trial.

### Shot in an Austrian Prison.

VIENNA, Nov. 1.—A shot centered in a prison near Styria in Upper Austria. The prisoners refused to go to work, and resisted the guards when they tried to compel them. Two of the prisoners were wounded before the trouble was ended.

## THE FIGHTING MOORS.

### They Terribly Maltreated the Spaniards Whom They Took Prisoners.

MADRID, Nov. 1.—The Spanish Africa, from Melilla, arrived at Malaga. According to information brought by her the Spaniards have made another sortie from Melilla, and General Ortega at the head of a column of infantry and a body of cavalry has struck at the retreating garrisons of the detached forts Hostrogueiro and Cabrerizas, which have been for some time surrounded by Moors. General Ortega also succeeded in replacing the garrisons of the forts with fresh troops. The Moors continue to make desultory attacks upon the Spanish lines, and lately fired upon the ship which landed General Morales, the new commander of the Spanish forces, at Melilla.
