PRENDERGAST UNCONCERNED.

Mayor Harrison's Murderer Smiles at the Jeers of His Fellow Prisoners.

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—From the view Mayor Harrison's body was placed in the City Hall on Tuesday a continued procession of men moved through the corridors, past the guard, and the men who were in the corridors were necessary to keep the crowd from getting too close to the body.

While thousands upon the streets were viewing the funeral procession Prendergast, the assassin, whose bullet had caused the city sorrow, strode about the city in the county jail, apparently unconcerned of everything.

The Reading's Big Coal Business.

REPEAL BILL SIGNED.

The Measure Quickly Rushed Through the House AND HURRIED TO THE PRESIDENT.

The Chief Magistrate at Once Affixes His Signature to the Historic Document, and the Nation Returns to a Single Standard.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—Silver purchases by the government closed yesterday. The purpose for which Mr. Cleveland called Congress in extraordinary session was accomplished at 4:35 in the afternoon, when he affixed his signature to the bill to repeal unconditionally the purchasing clause of the Sherman law.

Speaker Crisp overruled them by putting the pending motion to order the previous question. It was carried with a vote. The bill had been brought up for a vote at 10 o'clock yesterday.

The final vote was taken at 2:59 p. m. The bill was engrossed immediately, and twenty minutes later the formal announcement was made to the senate that its amendment had been agreed to by the house.

After congratulating with each other for a few moments over the victory that had been achieved the president took up the engrossed copy of the bill and read it aloud. Then picking up a quill pen he affixed his autograph at 4:35, and thus, eighty-five days, four hours and twenty-five minutes after the extraordinary session convened, the remedy for the financial distress which Mr. Cleveland demanded in his message was applied.

Mr. White's Retirement Causes Surprise.

LEWISBURG, Nov. 2.—The appointment of Mr. James Roosevelt as secretary of the United States embassy to succeed Mr. Henry White has caused quite a commotion in the American colony here.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Joseph D. Hayes, 48 years old, messenger employed by Collins & Loper, brokers, Henry D. Garrett, alias Spector, 81 years old; James F. Buchanan, 47 years old, "manufacturer," were indicted by the grand jury.

The Ferris Wheel Still Revolves.

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—The Ferris wheel continued to revolve yesterday despite the fact that the city officials had closed all Amusement attractions. A company of German guards was sent to the wheel to enforce the order.

Three Hundred Made Idle by Fire.

ELKHON, Ind., Nov. 2.—The Elkhon window glass factory, employing 300 hands, was found to be on fire yesterday. The fire originated in the mixing rooms, and in twenty minutes the whole building was a mass of flames.

Minneapolis' Great Flour Production.

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 2.—The several mills in operation at Superior and Duluth last week produced 65,071 barrels of flour, against 59,971 barrels in the preceding week, 28,003 barrels for the corresponding time in 1892, and 18,254 barrels in 1891.
