### DIRECTUM'S VICTORY.

He Defeated Mascot Without Apparent Exertion.

NOT FORCED TO MAKE FAST TIME.

From Start to Finish the Champion Stationer Had Everything His Own Way. Mascot Acting Badly—Passed Lovers the World's Ten Mile Record.

New York, Nov. 3.—The first thoroughbred race between Directum and Mascot, which had been said to be the most sensational event that ever took place between harness horses, proved to be no sensation at all, so far as the race itself was concerned. There was but one horse in it. The only sensational part of the day's program and arrangements was the enormous crowd that gathered at the Fleetwood track to see the sport. There were between 6,000 and 7,000 people present. It was, perhaps, as large an assemblage as ever collected at that track. There were visitors present from Detroit, Chicago, St. Louis, Indianapolis, and even from places as far away as Denver and California.



Directum won the toss for the pole, and when they were sent away in the first heat on the second scoring Directum got pretty nearly half a length the advantage. Kelly was holding Directum's reins and Andrews drove Mascot. The horses had not made over 100 yards when Mascot threw up his heels in a shameful break and lost five or six lengths by so doing. Kelly at once took Directum back and held him close until Mascot recovered and got within a length of him. Mascot broke again and lost more ground, and Directum had things his own way to the finish, which he passed at least five lengths in front of his opponent. The time for that mile was 2:10 1/2.

Directum got a little the best of the start in the second heat, too, and held it easily. Kelly was taking things easy with Directum, knowing that his adversary could never overtake him, and while Andrews tried his best, Directum passed under the wire fully four lengths to the good. The time for the second heat was 2:07 1/2. The third heat was the only one that contained a tinge of interest. In this, as in the other heats, Directum was from a neck to half a length in advance when the racers were told to go, and that advantage he increased to a good length before the first turn had been rounded. The pair ran for a half mile with Mascot's nose well on to the wheels of Directum's sulky, and then the pace was called upon to move up.

Mascot showed a good bear and steady movement. He tried his best to do what he was bidden, but as he attempted to improve his position Kelly made a slight demand upon the black horse, whose movement had been simply perfect from the time that he first made a scolding under the wire, and the black fellow shot ahead like a bullet, and within the next hundred feet left plenty of daylight between his driver's back and the horse that was trying to win \$20 from him. Going up the hill on the left side of the track Directum increased his lead, going smoothly, more like a machine in his perfect motion than a living thing, and when Kelly had secured three lengths' advantage he let up a little bit on his charge.

Mascot, however, kept going all the time, and when they came into the stretch Mascot had again lapped the leader. Kelly gave another little push to his horse, but Mascot continued to elude. Kelly then saw that he would have to drive to win, and for the first time during the match he compelled Directum to exert himself. The horse responded splendidly, and opened a gap of perhaps half a length between his sulky and Mascot's nose. This was at a point within a hundred yards of the finish. Andrews, although he knew that he was beaten, kept his gelding moving, but could not decrease the lead, and it was in those positions that the contestants passed under the wire in the third heat. The time of the last heat was 2:08 1/2.

The match was for \$2,500 a side. Another interesting event was the ten mile trot of Pascal, the holder of the record for that distance, made at Stockton, Cal., of 21:25. Yesterday Pascal made the distance in 20:15, thus knocking off 1 1/2 min. 5/8 secs. from the world's record.

Another Steamer for Peixoto.  
NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—The steamer Peixoto arrived here this morning and joined Peixoto's New York line. Negotiations were completed for her sale in Boston yesterday, and the price agreed upon is \$250,000. The Peixoto is known among Boston shipping men as the "White Elephant." She has been laid up in East Boston during the summer, having proved too expensive for use as a passenger steamer. She is of 2,000 ton register, and the cost of building was \$250,000.

A Young Farmer Held Up.  
FLEMINGTON, N. J., Nov. 3.—Behford Yawger, a young farmer of Lebanon, while driving home from Stanton station during the night, met two strangers in a buggy in a lonely wood. They grabbed his horse, pointed a pistol at his head, searched his pockets and succeeded in getting a small amount of money. Two weeks ago a similar robbery occurred near the same place.

Father Murphy may be Excommunicated.  
PATRICK, N. J., Nov. 3.—Rev. Dr. Smith said today that Mgr. Sotelli had written him that if Rev. Father Murphy did not leave St. Joseph's parish house within four days he would be excommunicated. Father Murphy believes that Dr. Smith has not received any such letter.

Tried to Cremate His Murdered Wife.  
ATLANTA, Nov. 2.—C. A. Williams, of Chambers county, Ala., killed his wife and tried to burn her body, but the fire went out. Williams has fled.

### WHOLESALE SLAUGHTER

Lobengula's Savage Warriors Moved Down by British Machine Guns.

CAPE TOWN, Nov. 3.—King Lobengula is flying northward, and when last reported, at Fort Charter by the native runners sent out to the rear in order to open up communication between the columns in pursuit and that fort, the fugitive king was trying to rally his troops. The king has been located about a hundred miles north of Bulawayo.  
King Lobengula seems to have fallen into a complete trap, as his further flight northward towards the Zambezi river is blocked and impossible, while the softly conveyed in his rear and Fort Salisbury on his right flank. On his left flank the British columns are advancing, and thus it is expected that the king will be compelled to surrender within a few days' time.  
On Oct. 31, between night and dawn, the Mataabes, estimated to be 5,000 strong, made a desperate rush forward upon the camp, attacking from several sides at once and in one instance sweeping by and over an advance picket which had not been called into the main body. The Mataabes came forward to the black wall, showing admirable discipline and the greatest bravery.  
The British commanders allowed King Lobengula's impetuosity to advance until they were within easy range of the Maxim rifles and Maxim guns, when at a pre-arranged signal a deadly fire was poured into the Mataabes.  
Then, for a few moments there was a scene witnessed which was peculiarly horrible, from the desperate courage displayed by the Mataabes and by the display of terrible engineering, death dealing skill made by the machine guns which poured bullets like water from a hose into the howling natives, mowing them down like grass. Before such a death dealing fire it was not to be expected that human beings could make a stand, and they broke and fled, still followed by the leaden rain and leaving 500 killed and wounded on the field, in addition to carrying away with them hundreds of other who were wounded, while as many more at least were able to stagger away in retreat bearing many or less severe wounds, from which numbers of them have since died.  
Only two of the colonists were killed and six wounded.

### A Serbian Ex-Minister Murdered.

BELGRADE, Nov. 3.—M. Veldimirovitch, formerly Serbian minister of public works, was found dead in his bedroom in his own den on Nov. 3. His head had been severed from his body, which was mutilated in a horrible manner. A large sum of money and a quantity of valuables were stolen. There is no clue to the author or authors of the crime. It is believed, however, that robbery was not the principal motive, and that the crime was due to political animosity. Veldimirovitch was at the head of the ministry of justice.

### Frontier Deaths Not Unlikely.

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—Patrick Eugene Joseph, President of the numbers, the Mayor Harrison, was arraigned in Judge Horton's court. The court room was crowded, and when the prisoner was led in by the jailer the spectators jumped to their feet. The action terrified Prendergast, and with blanched face he crouched close to the officers. He could scarcely stand, and had to be assisted to his seat. He feebly pleaded not guilty.

### Best of the Grand Trunk Victims.

BAYLE CREEK, Mich., Nov. 3.—The last two bodies left in the morgue here that were taken from the Grand Trunk wreck have been sent to Tillamook, Ore., as the remains of Oliver Dornand and wife. Nothing was left but the trunks, and identification was impossible, but they are the only ones among the bodies are supposed to be the right ones.

### Campania Now the Champion.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The Grand line steamer Campana, which left New York on Oct. 28, made the passage to Brazil in 10 days, nine hours and thirty minutes, thus beating all other regular lines. The best previous record was that of the sister ship, the Laconia—five days, twelve hours and thirty minutes.

### Selfie After a Sneeze.

TOLEDO, O., Nov. 3.—Thomas Palmer, of 782 Sixth avenue, New York, was found dead in his bed at the Hotel La Grange last evening. His death was the result of a protracted sneeze. He has a wife in New York, and is a brother of General Palmer, of that city.

### EXPLOSION AND DEATH.

Terrible Disaster in a New York Car Stable.

SIX WORKMEN INSTANTLY KILLED.

It Is Believed Others Are Buried Beneath the Ruins—A Number Seriously Injured. The Exploding Boiler in Charge of an Unlicensed Engineer.

New York, Nov. 3.—Six men killed, others supposed to be dead under the ruins, a dozen persons injured, several horses dead and property damaged to the extent of about \$100,000 is the sum total of the havoc wrought by the explosion of a boiler yesterday. It was in the stables of the Dry Dock, East Broadway and Battery street railway, on East Fourteenth street.

Following is a list of the dead so far as known: John Armstrong, engineer; Thomas Hanson, laborer; Samuel D. May, driver; John Royal, teamman; Joseph H. Quinn, laborer; Charles Breslin, laborer.

Of the injured this is but a partial list, as many who were hurt disappeared from the scene. Michael McDonald, aged 28, at Bellevue hospital, both fractured; Patrick McDonald, aged 40, both thigh bones fractured; Mrs. Jacobson, out by flying glass; Annie Gallagher, badly injured by flying glass; John Ruhl, struck by falling timber; Myrtle Gallagher, out by flying glass; John Rheinfrank, out by glass.

In that portion to which the explosion was confined about fifteen men were at work, mostly on the ground floor—the building is three stories, and of brick—banking up corn and grain.

Without waiting a terrific crash was heard, and the air for yards in every direction was filled with bricks, timbers, iron and debris of every description. The entire fronts of two stable buildings were blown into the street. The second floor, on which was banked hundreds of tons of fodder, fell, going through into the cellar. The destruction of the building was complete and terrible.

Directly in front of the window of a saloon kept by John Ruhl lay the boiler. There was scarcely a trace in its side. The riveting about the bottom showed that the immense cylinder had been torn out by the roots.

Sergeant Washington Mullin, of the boiler inspecting bureau, says the explosion was caused by an overpressure. Engineer Armstrong, it is said, was not licensed to run a boiler of the pattern that exploded.

The bodies of a dozen horses have been dragged from the ruins.
