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WHAT has become of Representative Lesell's Arbitration bill?

THURSDAY the Kensington workmen had a taste of good Democratic times.

A HOWL OF PROTEST. The country has risen against the proposed new tariff measure, which the Democratic aggregation has brought forward, in a manner that ought to make even these people pause.

It is like the Republican gale which swept over the country in the recent elections—only more so.

The people may have been deceived, but so have many before, but the "flim flammer," the bunco steerer, the three card monte man cannot keep up his game forever, and the victims are liable to awake to a sense of their deception.

So it has been in this tariff business. The people were deceived but now they know it. As a result they are howling against the proposed measure with a voice so vigorous that it does great credit to their common sense.

The objection to the Wilson bill is not confined to any one locality, but is widespread. This is due to the fact that in the promulgation of the measure the people find themselves face to face with the inside tricks of the game by which the Democrats flim flammed themselves into power.

They see now that all this talk about getting things for half price under the new tariff is nonsense, in view of the fact that they are likely not only to have in their pockets half price but no price at all.

They see that manufacturers who are able to continue at all will have to do so by making tremendous cuts in workmen's wages and that in many instances they will have to shut up shops and throw thousands on thousands out of work.

This is the universal comment of the manufacturers and it is beyond refutation, too. It is no wonder, in view of these facts, that the people are crying out with a loud voice and it will be, indeed, not only extraordinary, but infamous if in the face of these universal protests the proposed iniquitous legislation is put through.

Mr. Steverin said in an interview: "I find that in order to build the order up to its former grandeur a great deal of personal work will have to be done."

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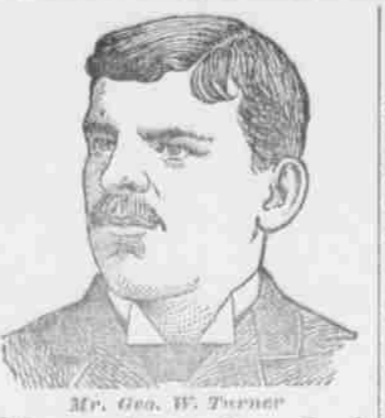
