Obituary.

Robert A. Zerby, brother of Editor J. B. Zerby, of the Pottsville Republican, and Engineer Fred Zerby, of Lost Creek, died at his home in Pottsville at 3 o'clock this morning. His death was caused by a pleurisy fever and meningitis. Mr. Zerby was 33 years of age and left a wife and two children. He had a number of friends in this town and the news of his death made a profound impression upon them, especially his former co-employees on the Herald staff. Mr. Zerby became foreman for the Herald when the office was temporarily moved to Pottsville after the big fire of 1883 and held that position on the paper for some time after his removal back to town. He subsequently entered the employ of the Republican under his brother and soon became foreman of that paper, which position he held up to the time of his death. He was also correspondent for the New York Associated Press Association.

Rev. H. D. Shultz, formerly pastor of the Evangelical church of town and now located at Bethlehem, was defendant in a libel suit at Sunbury yesterday brought by ex-Rev. Seis. The case was before Judge Stitzer, of Truhammock, Wyoming county. After the prosecution submitted its evidence counsel for Mr. Shultz moved to have the complaint dismissed on the ground that it had not been sustained by the evidence. The court granted the motion and fixed to-day for hearing arguments on the objections made to the decision by the plaintiff's counsel. C. H. Sampson and Mrs. William Snyder, of town, were in attendance at the court to testify in behalf of Rev. Shultz.

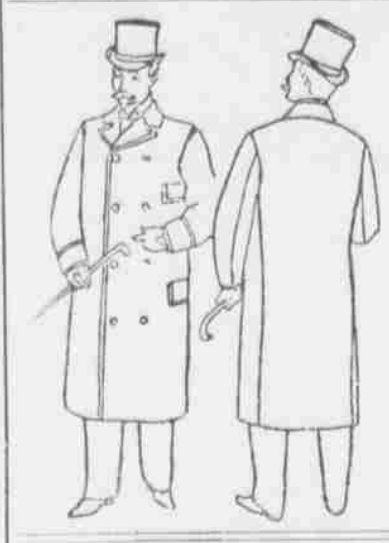
