CHANCE FOR INVESTORS

People looking for a safe and good investment will do well to give attention to the bond issue of the Lakeside Railway Company. The company is offering for public subscription, at par, \$150,000 worth of first mortgage, forty-year, six per cent. (gold) bonds, with interest payable in May and November of each year until the principal of the bonds mature in 1923, unless sooner redeemed. The denomination of the bonds are \$100, \$50, and \$1,000.

The chances for a safe investment at six per cent. are more the exception than the rule and, therefore, individuals, lodges or corporations having a surplus on hand should not hesitate in taking advantage of this offer.

The Lakeside Company has authorized the issue of \$250,000 in bonds as described but only \$150,000 of this amount will be sold at present and the mortgage securing them is an absolute first lien upon all the rights and franchises of the company, together with its line of railway between Shenandoah and Mahanoy City, already constructed, which has cost more than the total issue of the bonds and the extension to Lakeside Park, to be constructed at an early day.

The section of the road constructed is substantial in every detail. The road way is of 70-pound T-rails, the bridges are all iron and the wire used is the best in the market. The power house is a commodious fire proof structure of stone and corrugated iron, is equipped with a double set of Kodak compound steam engines, and a double set of electric generators. The electrical plant is of the finest character and of the Westinghouse pattern. The Equitable Trust Company, of Philadelphia, is a trustee in the mortgage on the bonds.

Aside from the excellent, substantial equipment of the road, as already constructed, there is the splendid territory through which the road passes as a surety for good revenue. The line between Shenandoah and Mahanoy City will be one of the best paying electric roads in the country and the revenue will be greatly increased when the road is completed through Robinson's, Bowman's, Shoemakers, Park Place, Trenton and Delano to Lakeside, the latter place being but seven miles distant from Mahanoy City, and the intervening places are dependent upon the latter or Shenandoah, for markets.

THE WEEK IN CONGRESS

Hawaii and the Federal Elections Repealer to the Front.

BLAND'S SILVER COINAGE BILL

It will be brought up in the House on Wednesday—The Federal Elections Repealer to be Voted on Tomorrow in the Senate.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—The first two days of the present week in the senate will be taken up with the federal elections bill, to the exclusion of everything else except the routine morning business, which will include only the introduction of bills and the presentation of reports and petitions. The senate has agreed that the discussion of the bond resolution of Senator Stewart, which under ordinary circumstances would have right of way up to 2 o'clock of each day until disposed of, shall go over until Wednesday to permit the uninterrupted continuation of the debate on the elections bill, upon which the vote will be taken tomorrow afternoon.

The agreement provides that the senate shall sit tomorrow until this measure is disposed of, and in all probability it will be disposed of. There is a bare possibility, however, that the debate may not be exhausted by that time, and that the disposition of it will not be accomplished then, as agreements of this kind in the senate are not always considered as inviolative. There is also an agreement that the discussion of the bond resolution shall be resumed on Wednesday, and the week is likely to produce several speeches upon this question.

It is possible that the Hawaiian resolution introduced by Senator Turpie from the foreign relations committee, or the house resolution on the same subject, which will probably reach the senate during the week, will receive a degree of attention, but it is hardly probable that much time will be given it, because of the other subjects pressing for attention.

The Hawaiian debate, Mr. Bland's bill for the coinage of the silver, re-ignition of the treasury, the O'Neill-Joy contested election case and perhaps the fortification appropriation bill will occupy the attention of the house during the week. By an arrangement agreed upon just before the house adjourned Saturday night the Hawaiian debate is to be extended until 3:30 tomorrow afternoon, the special order for its consideration being modified so as to include a provision for a vote upon the Boutelle resolution, as well as the McCreary and Pitt resolutions.

The extension of the time will serve the purpose of definitely disposing of Hawaii in the house inasmuch as tomorrow had the order not been modified, it was Mr. Boutelle's intention to come to the front with his resolution. As it was a privileged question it could not have been put aside and might have resulted in additional complications, so that the Democratic leaders concluded that the shortest way out of the difficulty would be to agree to the compromise.

As yet no Democrat has broken over party lines in the Hawaiian matter, as far as debate is concerned, and it seems likely that the McCreary resolution will pass by practically a party vote. Mr. Holman, however, is still bent upon offering his resolution condemning the action of Mr. Stevens, but at the same time approving the course of the administration in attempting to restore the deposed queen.

On Wednesday Mr. Bland will call up his bill for the coinage of the silver and go over the treasury (amounting to over \$5,000,000) that sum to be made immediately available if necessary to meet the wants of the treasury, by the issuance of treasury notes similar to those issued under the act of 1890. Mr. Bland and many of his Democratic colleagues, who are bitterly opposed to the bond issue, want to relieve the treasury in this way rather than by the issue of bonds.

On Friday the O'Neill-Joy contested election case will come up, and if disposed of on that day will be followed by the fortification appropriation bill, if being the intention of the appropriation committee to cross the appropriation bill forward as soon as the opportunity offers.

Killed by an Explosion. MISSENAUER, Mich., Feb. 5.—An explosion occurred in the Barrett paper factory yesterday. Several hours later the dead body of Night Engineer James Johnson was found in the building. It is supposed that the pipe of the still clogged up and that he went on top of the still to discover the cause, when the inflammable vapor exploded. His body was terribly mangled.

Settled Their Feud with Bullets. BUCKINGHAM, Miss., Feb. 5.—Two farmers living near here met on the street, and a duel with pistols took place. When the smoke cleared away it was found that James A. England was shot three times through the bowels, dying from the effects, and Loford Smith was shot through the stomach and cannot recover. An old feud existed between the men.

Valuable Horses Cremated. CHILLOCHETTER, Me., Feb. 5.—Forty-six head of valuable horses were cremated, together with two boxes of the Hon. Henry C. Ireland, near here. The fire was of incendiary origin.

Notorious Spanish Bandit Killed. MADRID, Feb. 5.—The notorious bandit, Barillas, the scourge of the province of Valencia, has been surprised by gendarmes and killed after a desperate fight.

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A Splendid Church Dedicated. CARLEISLE, Pa., Feb. 5.—The dedication of St. Patrick's Roman Catholic church took place here yesterday in the presence of Governor Pattison and a large audience, which included many other distinguished men. The sermon was delivered by Bishop Hall, who thanked Governor Pattison in the name of 900,000 Catholics in Pennsylvania for his presence at the ceremonies. Bishop McEvoy in closing also thanked Governor Pattison. The congregation of St. Patrick's is one of the oldest in the state, having been organized 115 years ago. The new edifice is one of the finest in this city, and cost \$20,000.

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Shortridge Cannot Recover. MEDIA, Pa., Feb. 5.—Professor Switlin C. Shortridge, who shot down his bride of six weeks while insane, and who was afterward removed to the Norristown asylum, is reported to have shown no improvement in his condition during his two weeks in that institution. At times he is very violent, and his physicians give no hope that he will ever recover his reason.

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Tried to Cremate Himself. ATLANTIC CITY, Feb. 5.—Lizzie Crodon, an insane negro, attempted to destroy herself and the small shanty in which she lived by setting fire to a mattress, after locking herself in a room and barricading the door. A policeman broke into the place and rescued the crazed woman, who butted desperately with him. The building was gutted.

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His Right Arm Blown Off. GREENSBURG, Pa., Feb. 5.—A 7-year-old boy named Clark Fink, of North Greensburg, while on the way from school found a piece of gas pipe, and taking it home stirred the fire with it. The pipe was loaded with dynamite and exploded. The boy's right arm was blown off.

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Another Murder in Chester. CHESTER, Pa., Feb. 5.—During a quarrel Saturday night John Saunders, 30 years old, was stabbed in the stomach. He was removed to the Chester hospital, where he died yesterday morning. James Lyne is under arrest charged with the crime.
