Ed Stokes Wins His Suit. NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—The jury which has been hearing for several days the second trial of the action of Edw. & S. Stokes to recover \$75,000 and much interest and costs from John W. Mackay by virtue of an agreement to pay \$100,000 for certain stock, of which \$25,000 was paid on account, brought in a verdict before Justice Patterson for the full amount claimed. The judgment is for exactly \$91,500. The case went all the way to the court of appeals, being fought stubbornly.

Robert Deem and Philip Hüntzinger, two middle-weight pugilists of local reputation, fought eight rounds in Armory hall last evening for the prize receipts, which amounted to about \$25. Slugging was the order of the evening, the crowd cheering to blood and knockdowns. Through every round the pair clinched and hugged like lovers.
