Especial to the HESALD MAHANOY CITY, March 17 .- Two pe cultar accidents occurred at a funeral here yesterday morning. The remains of Mrs. Miller were being placed in the hearse which stood near the west end of Centre streetijwhen the horses became frightened at a passing car and made a move backward that joited the coffin from the hamls of the pall bearers.

The heavy casket fell to the payemen and broke open. The crowd, horrifled by the sight fell back toward the house when the pavement suddenly opened and a number of people dropped into a coal cellar, one on top of another, but, for tunately, no one was seriously injured.
