MAHANAOY CITY, March 17.—Two peculiar accidents occurred at a funeral here yesterday morning.

The heavy casket fell to the pavement and broke open. The crowd, horrified by the sight fell back toward the house, when the pavement suddenly opened and a number of people dropped into a coal cellar, one on top of another, but, fortunately, no one was seriously injured.

The cause of the break in the pavement was the insufficiency of the wooden supports to uphold the unusual weight of the crowd.

The coffin was speedily repaired and the procession moved off.
