ORDERED AWAY FROM BRAZIL

An Order That Will be Welcomed by United States Saltors. WASHINGTON, March 20.—The American first at Hio, the largest assembled in a foreign port since the war, will be a thing of the past in a day or two and the ships will be scattered north and south. The San Francisco has already left for Blue-

San Francisco has already left for Billie-fields with Admiral Benham aboard. She will stop at St. Lucis, near Harbadoes, for coal. Yesterday the Detroit sailed for Hampton Roads. It was the intention of the navy department to keep the remain-ing vessels at Rio for a week or two longer, until it was certain that no further trouble was to be apprehended. But this program was abandoned upon the receipt of a cablegram from Captain Philip, of the New York, the commanding officer of the flest, after Admiral Benham's depart-

ure. The telegram read:
"Rio Harbor is clear of foreign men-ofwar except the New York and Charleston The Portuguese vessel was the last to leave. It is reported here that Da Game was a passenger on her. The fever is in-creasing in violence, and has reached the epidemic stage, so that the British steam ers coming northward will not touch at Rio. It does not appear that there re-mains any further necessity for keeping an American man-of-war here, as the in-surrection has been put down, and a longer stay of the ressels would be in-

judicious."
Immediately upon the receipt of thi dispatch Secretary Herbert sent orders to the New York to proceed north to the West Indies. She will probably touch at St. Nicholas mole or some other cable por and receive further orders. The Charles ton was directed to go south to Montey dec, where she will probably get orders to proceed to the Pacific station.
