For the nomination of candidates respectively for floverior, Lieutenant flovernor, two members of Congress from the state at large, Auditor General, Secretary of Internal Affairs, and for the transaction of such other business as may be presented.

Attention is called to the rule adopted at the State Concention of 1805 providing for the basis of representation as follows:

Representations in future state conventions shall be based upon the vote cast at the Presidential or gubernatorial election limmediatory procedime, one delegate being allotted to each legislative district for over 2,000 Republican votes and an additional delegate for a fraction occording 1,000 votes, each district to have at least one delegate.

The representatives to which each dis-trict of the county is entitled to is as follows: First district, 1; Second district, 1; Third district, 4; Fourth district, 3.

#### DUTY CALLS.

It may as well be known now as at any time whether the borough authorities of this town intens to to their duty, or only exercise it whenever they think conven ient, or best suited to their political unierest. Many of the witnesses of the disgraceful scene at the funeral on Monday were disgusted and to some extent alarmed at the full sway the rioters (for they were nothing less; were allowed, in spire of the fact that the authorities had been notified that there possibly would be a demonstration at the funeral.

The demonstration was a Jugrant violation of the borough laws and the National and State Conscitution, because it was directed against certain parties who had refused to recognize or support the religious doctrines of which this mol held itself out as champion.

If some of the ignorant masses who have come here to enjoy the liberties of America want to enjoy them they must first learn to respect the rights of others and not get the notion that a membership in a certain religious denomination or papers of citizenship gives them a license to persecute and oppress those who enjoy equal rights.

In the language of the Constitution of Pennsylvania all men are born equally free and independent, and have certain inherent and indefeasible rights, among which are those of enjoying and defend ing life and liberty, of acquiring, possess ing and protecting property and reputation, and pursuing their own happiness All men have a natural and indefeasible right to worship Almighty God according to the dictates of their own conscien ces; no man can of right be compelled to attend, erect or support any place of worship, or to maintain any ministry against his consent; no human authority can, in no case whatever, control or inter fere with the rights of conscience, and no preference shall ever be given by law to any religious establishments or modes

of worship. It would be an excellent idea to arrest every one who was in that mob on Monday and read these provisions of the Constitution to them until they get suffictently versed in some of the true princi ples of American liberty to understand what citizenship implies.

At me time has there been an occasion showing more clearly the necessity of having men know something of the fundamental principles of the American government than the present. Our lown is rapidly filling up with a class of people who think the only aim in life is to fear God and make money. These classes nave shown thomselves as in a great part constituted of men and women who have listle if any principle and no respect or sympathy for their fellow beings, even

to members of their own family. A humane, intelligent and law-abiding people are by force of circumstances compelled to live in the midst of these other classes, and they have a right to do so. And, at the same time, they have the right to expect that the people who are

The seed sown on Monday was these ignorant masses get the idea that such a demonstration could be carried on in the streets of the borough without a

protest from the authorities. It is not too late to make a protest and set an example, if the proper authorities will make an earnest effort to arrest the parties who were implicated in the alfair.

DOXEY HAS LEFT FOR CHICAGO.

But He Promises to Return to the Wanderers-The March Thus Par Has Been Orderly, but Creates No Enthusiasm Among the People.

ALLIANCE, O., March 28.—Twelve miles of the longest free lunch route on record was mapped out for the Coxey caravan yesterday. January weather was also on the program, but the sympathy of the the program, but the sympathy of the people along the line of march is making it possible for the men to progress without any particular hardships. They were cherred yesterday morning by sausage, ham, dry bread and black coffee. Soap is still among the things invisible, and there is no danger that anybody is going to mistake this for a turnout of plutocrats. Only soap, and they are not particular about using it. All bixuries are carefully treas-

The health of the marchers has been re markably good, considering their experi-ence. Meals that have been irregular, when they were provided at all, and sleeping on frozen ground with a scant cover-ing of straw is not ordinarily considered conducive to a man's physical well being. There is no physician in camp unless Dr. Kirtiand, the nervous little Pittsburg astronomer, is an M. D.
