THE WEEK IN CONGRESS

The Tariff Bill Fairly Launched in the Senate.

SEVERAL WEEKS OF TALK AHEAD.

As Many Senators Have Speeches to Deliver No Idea as to When the Vote Will be Taken can be Given - The House Contested Election Cases.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—The tariff bill was taken up for consideration in the senate at 2 o'clock this afternoon in accordance with the agreement arrived at in the committee on finance...

The tariff bill will be the only order after 5 o'clock each day of the week, or until the morning business shall be disposed of, and there will be two hours each day for the consideration of miscellaneous questions which properly belong to that hour.

Several amendments to the tariff bill will be offered by the committee on finance, after which the speaking will begin, in which Senator Voorhees, as chairman of the finance committee, will lead off. He will be replied to by Senator Allison, but beyond these speeches it is not known in what order senators will be heard.

An exciting week is promised in the house. The struggle over the O'Neill-Toy contested election was resumed today. Although it has been apparent since this case has been up that at least a dozen Democrats were opposed to sending the Democratic contestant, the partisan feeling engendered during the last three days of the filibuster has served to drive those who were lukewarm into camp, and while they will probably not vote for O'Neill they will at least lend their votes and presence to make the necessary quorum to send the St. Louis Democrat.

Tomorrow, according to the notice served by Mr. Bland on Friday, he will ask the house to consider the president's veto of the silver seigniorage bill and will move to pass the bill over the veto. As it requires a two-thirds vote to override the objections of the president there is little hope that Mr. Bland's motion can be carried.

No trouble is expected by the Breckinridge forces in the branch of promise made from the writ signed by Speaker Crisp announcing him to appear at the house to help make a quorum for the Jay-O'Neill election contest.

HARRISBURG, April 2.—William Bowen and John Dudley, the plate workers, who came to this country from Wales recently by way of work, blew out the gas in their room at the Groves hotel, in this city. When the porter went to call them Bowen was dead from the effects of the gas and Dudley was unconscious. Dudley was removed to the hospital.
