NEW YORK, April 14.-After an illness of New York, April 14.—After an times of exactly twenty-four hours David Dudley Field died yesterday of pnoumonia, at the residence of his daughter in law, Mrs. Dud-ley Field, 22 Gramercy park. When Mr. Field arrived on Wednesday from Genea Field arrived on Wednesday from Genoa his face bore the color and other evidences of almost perfect health. He was wel-



comed at the foot of the gaugplank by a party of friends and relatives, and in the season of good feeling upon his arrival home none was more bright or cheery than Mr. Field himself.

After having arrived within the warmth of the house Mr. Field complained of no uneasiness or discomfort from his expoure on the pier, and all through the day of Wednesday none could have been more brightly entertaining than he. At 3 o'clock Thursday morting Mr. Field was seized with a congestive chill. Upon the arrival of the physician he detected immediately upon examination the fact that Mr. Field was threatened with pneumonia. Des-pite all that medical skill could do the disease rapidly developed until death came to his relief. There were only three per to his relief. sons with him when he expired-Mrs. Dudley Field, Miss Clars Field and Dr.

Burt. The funeral services will take place at Calvary church tomorrow afternoon at 4:00 o'clock. The interment will take place at Stockbridge, Mass., on Monday.


A DISTINGUISHED CAREER.

He Had Been Known Throughout the

Nation for Over Thirty Years. A mind that began to take in lasting impressions amid the cannon thunders of the last war with Britain and of Napoleon's Waterloo campaign and retained a marvelous activity for more than four score years went out with the death of David Dudley Field. It is only six years ago that Mr. Field, long past the octogenarian mile post, grappled a pompous looking young swell who had brutally assailed a newsboy on the street and shook him as a terrier would a rat. "Yon are a disgrace to humanity," said he as he set the astonished dude on his feet. "Old as I am I can thrash you."

Mr. Field comes from a family noted for its vigor. His profession was conduc-ive to long life, and this is a period noted for busy octogenarians. Nevertheless a working lawyer on the verge of 90 has to be accounted for on other general princi-ples. He was born at Haddam, Cohn., a town at the foot of the Berkshire hills, in 1805. He was the oldest of ten children and the most noted of four famous Field brothers

David Dudley attended Williams college from his 17th to his 21st year, and then began to study law at Albany. He was admitted to the New York city bar in 1828.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., April 14.-The Indus trial Army arrived here into systeminy afternoon, with banners flying and men cheering. The train was not permitted to stop within the city limits, but engines were changed at Collette, five miles west of the city, and the train of twenty five cars was afterwards run through to East Cheyenne, where but a brief stop was made to take on a supply of provisions including 1,380 loaves of bread and five

beeves, furnished by the city, enough to feed the men until North Platte, Neb., is reached. The railread officials decided to Push the army right through Nebraska on fast freight schedule, reaching Omaha this afternoon. General Keily and his men expected to go via Denver, but the Union Pacific refused to run the train outh

uth. General Kelly said: 'I had hoped to call on Governor Walte and thank him personally for his expres-sion of sympathy. But it is impossible, We must hurry on to Washington as rapidly as possible while we have the oppor tunity

To local railroad, city and county officials and citizens who went out to visit the Collette camp General Kelly said in a spriegh:

"I am confident the army will accom-plish its purpose. We are respectable men. We found six tramps among us on reach-ing Green River, but they were left with the local authorities. Every man of us has taken a personal obligation not to violate any law of the land, and we are going direct to Washington to petition congress for deserved relief. California has kept these men and 10,000 more for over two years, and we believe it is now the government's duty to give us em-ployment. We ask reliaf for only a year or so, when we shall be able to do for ourselves. We do not propose to destroy property, or menace congressmen who will not listen to us. "This industrial movement Is senarate

from Coxey's army. He has nothing to de with us. On reaching Washington we will call upon Congressman Pence, of Colo-rado, and Delegate Rawlins, of Utah, to enlist them in our behalf. The best of discipline prevails, and the men are sworn tracker their offeren " to obey their officers.'

MR. SOVEREIGN'S VIEWS. He Fears That the Coxey Movement For-

bodes an Insurrection. BOSTON, April 14.-Grand Master Workman Sovereign of the Knights of Labor is here. In an interview with an Associated Press reporter he said:

"The general condition of the working-men throughout the country is not im-proved, despite the statements of the press to the contrary. I expect no relief from either of the old parties, and if they expect our votes they must nominate not men who promise, but men who have done for the masses, or we will put up candidates of our own. There is plenty of business, but it is too far between dollars." In speaking of Coxey's army the labor leader became impressive.

"Coxey's movement is the forboding of an insurrection. I do not mean that the army itself is anything but peaceful, but I do mean that tens of thousands of toil-ing men are watching the movement, ready to resent any abuse the army may receive from municipal, state or national officials. The army is to the working man today what John Brown's party was to the alaves before the war. I don't suppose that anything will be directly accomplished by Coxey or his men, but the move-ment has caused thousands to think about these things, and the result will be a gen-eral protest against injustice done the

The practice which gave him his great fame, however, did not begin until the civil war period, when he

was 60 years old. At the close of the war three Indianians, Bowles, Milligan and Horsey, were serving life sentences Mr conspiracy to set free the Confederate prisoners at Indian apolis, and otherwise hinder the prosect tion of the war. They had been tried by a military commission in a state where or dinary courts were open and war did not prevail. Mr. Field argued that military commissions were illegal under the cir-cumstances, and the United States su-prems court ordered the men released. Afterward Mr. Field was counsel for the shareholders who ousted Fiske and Gould from the Eric railway. He also acted for the New York police in their controversy with Mayor Fernando Wood, which nearly resulted in a local war. He appeared in the case of the state of Georgia against Grant and other generals.

Mr. Field's highest fame will rest upon Mr. Frein's ingress tame win rest upon his labors in the science of jurisprudence. While a young man he began to write upon the necessity for reform and reor-ganization in the prevailing codes. He ganization in the prevailing codes. He continued the spitation from 1859 to 1847. He was appointed state commissioner on practice and pleading in the latter year and parformed the chief part of the work in preparing a code of procedure which was used for twenty years. 
