

COAL FAMINE FEARED. The Effects of the Diminished Supply Already Being Felt.

ADVANCE IN PRICES REPORTED.

Thirty Train Crews at Rochester Laid Off on Account of the Great Strike-Efforts to Get West Virginia Miners to Quit Work.

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., April 2X - The miners' strike is already making itself felt on the railroads entering here, and the different lines are taking steps guard against a failure of the supply. perintendent Corbett, of the Evanaville and Terre Haute railroad, has notified every agent along the line to hold all the soal now in the yards. At this point about twenty-five cars consigned to Chicago dealers have been held for the use of the engines. By this means the company expects to have enough coal to outlast the strike.

Rioting at La Salle, Ills.

La SALLE, Ills., April 25.-A mob of 1,500 miners from neighboring towns marched on La Salle to prevent the men margined on La Serie to provide a riot was bere from going to work, and a riot was precipitated in which a number of local miners were beaten and badly injured. Fritz Keling was cut and braised, and his condition is serious. Michael Begley, fore-man in the La Salle shaft, was severely pummeled. The majority of the other minutes who were intending to go into the pit were frightened out, and those who attempted it were roughly handled.

The West Virginia Miners.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., April 25. - Dele-gates from the United Mine Workers, rep-resenting New River and Kanawha districts and several others from Ohio and Pennsylvania, held a meeting here to con-sider what could be done to inaugurate a general strike in both valleys. It was a very enthusiastic and confident secret meeting, but nothing was done further than hearing reports of delegates and drafting resolutions to be given miners at each point. All miners at Pomeroy and on the Ohio side vere reported out.

The Price of Coal Advanced.

BUFFALO, April 25 .- The first result of the soft coal miners' strike is beginning to be felt. The price on the docks has been advanced to \$2.75 a ton. If the strike con-tinues for any length of time the lake steamers will be seriously crippled, as the supply is limited. The railroads have a supply sufficient to keep them running for three or four weeks, and fear a virtual suspension of navigation unless the strike is speedily terminated by compromise or other settlement.

Train Men Laid Off.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., April 25.-The busi-ness of carrying coal by the roads running from the Pennsylvania districts into Ro-chester is practically suspended, and thirty freight train crews have been thrown out of work. Probably twenty more crews will ultimately be thrown out of amploy-ment if the strike continues. Thus far about 100 men on the road have been affected.

Will Refuse a Local Settlement.

SPRINGUELD, III., April 25.—At a dele-gate convention of the mine workers of llinois held yesterday a resolution was adopted requesting all co-operative mines not organized to suspend work at once. It was also declared that no local settlement be recognized or authorized until a gen-eral settlement is had throughout the sntire United States.

More Illinois Miners Ont.

DANVILLE, Ills., April 25.-The miners of the various country and strip banks de-cided yesterday to Join the strike. Nearly 8,000 miners near Danville field are now out. The miners at Tilton, near here, will not permit the Wabash engines to coal there. This cuts off the coal of the Wabash road for three divisions.

Several hundred employees are affected by the re-duction. This is the first time the factory has been run on short time since it started In 1875.




Attempt to Strike Out the Fast Southern

Mail Subsidy Defeated. Mail subsidy Defeated. WASHINGTON, April 25.—Yesterday the glosing speech of the so called general de-bate of the tariff bill was made in the sen-ate by Mr. Mills, of Texas, for the Demperatic party. The galleries, which had been almost descried during the morning, filled up, and a number of representatives came over from the house. A number of Republican senators also gave Mr. Mills close attention throughout. Mr. Mills ap-pealed to his Democratic brethren to pass the bill promptly and fulfill the party's pledges. A large part of the speech was devoted to a discussion of the income tax,

which he warmly advocated. The house resumed the consideration of appropriation bills yesterday. After spend-ing the entire day in the discussion of amendments to the postoffice bill it was passed. Half of the time was devoted to debate on the Kyls amendment to strike out the subsidy of \$199,000 for the fast southern mail. The opposition to the ap-propriation proved surprisingly weak, however, when the vote was taken, only twenty votes being cast against it. Just before the house a curned Mr. Campbell (N. Y.) entered a motion to reconsider the vote by which the bill to prevent bookmaking at the spring and fall meetings in the District of Columbia was defeated on Monday.

Wellman Leaves Norway.

AALEBUND, April 95. - The American north polar expedition under the com-mand of Mr. Waiter Weilman, salled yesterday for the Island of Spitzbergen on the steamer Ragnveld Jarl. Experts here pronounce the steamer to be the best ice boat belonging to Norway. The Ameri-can aluminum boats that the expedition carries were greatly admired hars for their beauty, strength and lightness. The Case to be Proscented by Attorney General Maloney, of Illinois, and a Formidable Array of Legal Talent-An Alleged Oppressive Combination.

CRICAGO, April 25 .- The war of the state of Illinois against the great Chicago Gas trast began yesterday in the circuit court of Cook county. Attorney General Ma-loney and two brilliant assistant attorney generals and a formidable array of legal telent, representing property owners of the city of Chicago, are to prosecute the quo warranto proceedings, and if the state is successful the charter of the gas fruit will be revoked and the valuable fran chises of the various companies represent-ing the association become worthless as ing the association become worthese as the profit bearing mediums which have for so many yours been favorably listed on great stock exchanges of the country. The filing of the petition of the attorney general for permission to institute the proceedings of quo warranto was made public sharriy after & colock in the after-noon-after the closing of the stock ex-changes of the country, in order that the matter might not be made a means of in-

fluencing the market. To a reporter of the Associated Press

the attorney general said: "I have begun these proceedings after careful deliberation and painstaking in vestigation, and because I think the people of the state of Illinois have a just com plaint against this trust. There has been no time in my career in which I have posed as an anti-corporation man, for I believe the corporations have rights under the constitution and the laws which should be respected. But when they disregard the laws of the state and combine theirear ital and franchises to oppress the people it is the duty of the law officers of the state to wage a war for the disintegration of the unlawful combination.

"I merely want to say that I have begut this suit upon my own responsibility, and in utter disregard of the strictures that have been so frequently made on various sides. If I lose the suit which I am about sides. If I have the suit which I am about to wage to dissolve this trust I alone will take the responsibility. If I win it and rescue the public from the extortions to which I believe it has been unlawfully subjected, I desire whatever credit the people of the state of Illinois are willing to accord one who has not been coerced into the performance of an official duty. I know what is at stake, and when this warfare is ended I will be willing to be weighed in the balance of public opinion."

Waite After Prison Officials.


