NEW JERSEY LEGISLATURE

The House Passes Byrne's Bill Agains

Coercing Workingmen.
TRENTON, April 26.—The Republican loaders have decided that it will be impossible to get all their bills through by May. 6, and they will not adjourn until a week later

There was quite a lively discussion in the house over Mr. Byrne's bill making it unlawful for any corporation to have em-ployes sign any agreement renouncing en-isting or future membership in any organization, society or brotherhood. Mr. Byrne maintained that in many instances em ployes of corporations were as badly off as slaves before the war. Mr. Olcott took the position that the labor unions did the wage earners more harm than good. They made arbitrary rules and demands upon corporations, and attempted to govern the business of the latter. The bill passed unanimously.

Bills were passed legislating out of of-fice the board of fresholders of Camden, Mercer and Passale counties, and providthe city councils and township committees until next spring; also the new board of works bill for Newark and Jersey City.

The senate indefinately postponed action upon the veto message of Governor Werts upon the peace bill. The bill providing for the appointment of corporation sonneels and attorneys by the mayors of Newark and Jersey City caused a big fight in the senate. Three of the Republicans were absent when the bill came up, and the n the Democrats succeeded in having the ensot-Ading clause stricken out. The Republicans tf saved themselves from the control of the control saved themselves from utter rout by getting an adjournment.
