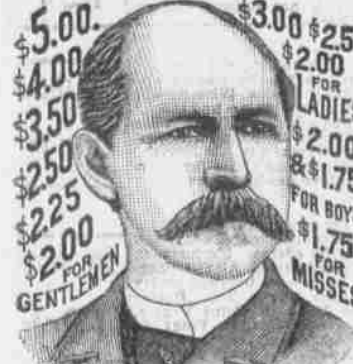

NOTES OF THE STRIKE.

No Resumption of Work Among the Striking Coal Workers.

WAITING FOR THE CONFERENCE.

President McBride Declares That the Rate Agreed Upon at Cleveland Will be Enforced Throughout the District—West Virginia Operators Will Not Attend.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 10.—A stable containing a number of coal-digging machines and located near the Norrisdale shaft of H. B. Wigton's mine, was set on fire, and nothing but the early discovery of the flames prevented a heavy loss and the flooding of the extensive mine. The striking miners have passed resolutions, strongly condemning the deed, and offer to furnish men to guard the company's property in order to prevent a possible recurrence of the offense during the strike. At Hughes' mine, near Oceola, 1,000 men made their appearance just as the mine was about to be opened for the day and held a brief conference with the owner, after which it was announced that the mine would shut down until after the conference at Cleveland.

Negro Miners Intimidated.

BRIMINGHAM, Ala., May 10.—After receiving three formal notices to quit work, which they refused to obey, the negro miners at Milldale, Tuscaloosa county, went out and joined the strikers. The cause of their yielding to the pressure was an anonymous notice posted about the mine Tuesday night, which read: "You have been given three notices to quit work. If you do not obey tomorrow morning you will not live to disobey longer." The notice was decked with skull and cross bones, and purported to be signed in blood with a drawn dagger.

Maryland's Mine Strikers.

CUMBERLAND, Md., May 10.—About 1,000 miners assembled at Knapp's meetings yesterday afternoon. After electing delegates to the Cleveland miners' meeting, a vote was taken and showed an overwhelming majority in favor of a strike. At Frostburg about 2,000 men are out and 1,800 still at work. The majority of the men seem opposed to suspension. In any event, it is not believed that suspension, if generally adopted, can last long.

Miners Snub Their Employer.

ST. LOUIS, May 10.—General Manager J. D. Crabb, of the Madison Coal company, made an attempt to hold a conference with his striking miners at Edwardsville, Ill., but met with a failure, none of the men attending, though they had been given a notice. Tomorrow they will be paid, and Mr. Crabb hopes then to be more successful in his efforts to reach a settlement with his men.

To Enforce a Uniform Rate.

PITTSBURG, May 10.—President John McBride and Secretary-Treasurer Patrick Melby, of the United Mine Workers' association, have assured the operators of this district that if a uniform rate is established at the Cleveland convention it will be maintained and enforced by the miners throughout the district. This has always been a question of dispute.

Will Not Attend the Conference.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., May 10.—Resolutions were passed by the West Virginia Coal Exchange to the effect that no operator from that state should attend the Cleveland meeting on May 15, that they will not permit business to be run by outside influence, and that Ohio should keep her hands out of West Virginia's coal business.

Fears of an Outbreak.

BALTIMORE, May 10.—Advices from the scene of the mining trouble at George's Creek are to the effect that only three mines are in operation. Trouble is expected at the mines, and the superintendents have telegraphed for instructions in the event the strikers attempt to molest the companies' properties.

Militia Under Arms at Akron.

AKRON, O., May 10.—Two companies of militia were called out by Mayor L. D. Waters, to assist in quelling a disturbance on the East Exchange street improvements. The unemployed in the city have driven off every foreigner employed on the streets, and are now endeavoring to secure by force \$1.50 a day for laborers. The police dispersed the mob and the militia were not called into active service. They will remain under arms for several days in anticipation of trouble.

Kept at Work by Threats.

UNIONTOWNS, Pa., May 10.—A delegation of Polish miners from Braddock and Connellsville, now here, charge that Superintendent Frank Bradford, of Rayney's Moyer works, forced six Slav miners into the pit at the point of Winchester, and is now keeping them prisoners against their will. Suit was brought against Superintendent Bradford for pointing firearms at workmen and for forcing them to work in the pit under duress.

Pierce Sentenced to Death.

CAPE MAY COURT HOUSE, N. J., May 10.—The jury in the case of Richard Pierce (colored) was only out twenty-five minutes, and returned a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree for killing his wife Sarah on Feb. 19. Judge Reed sentenced Pierce to be hanged on Friday, June 29. This will be the first hanging in the history of the county.

A Chinese Etropepeas.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 10.—Mrs. All Chang, wife of a local Chinese merchant, deceased for China on the steamer Oceanic, taking \$10,000 of her husband's money. The robbery was discovered by Ah Chang shortly after the steamer had sailed. It is believed that some Chinese lothario accompanied the woman.

The Blue Honors the Gray.

FREDRICKSBURG, Va., May 10.—On Scott's Island a delegation of Grand Army men, on behalf of the ladies of Washington, presented to R. S. Chew camp, Sons of Confederate Veterans, stands of Virginia and the national colors. Senator Little, for the camp, made a graceful speech of acceptance.

The American Cyclist Won.

PARIS, May 10.—Harry Wheeler, the professional American bicycle rider, won the twenty-five kilometers race at Velodrome yesterday, easily beating several crack French riders.

ANOTHER STOLEN TRAIN

It Has the Right of Way on the Missouri Pacific Road.

PREPARED TO CAPTURE THE GANG.

The Commonwealers Will be Met by an Armed Force of Five Hundred and Placed Under Arrest—Kelly Leaves Des Moines—The Other Industrial Armies.

TOPEKA, Kan., May 10.—Sanders' Cripple Creek (Colo.) band of Coxeyites are endeavoring to work their way east on a train stolen from the Missouri Pacific railroad, which was seized at Pueblo, Colo. When the railroad officials heard of the seizure they ordered all trains discontinued and had an engine detached at Olney. The industrialists, however, succeeded in getting around this by laying extra tracks. Then another locomotive was detached near Haswell, but this was also overcome by the train thieves. The water tank at Gridway was emptied, and the industrialists were obliged to obtain a supply from a well, carrying it in their dinner pails and coffee cups.

A special train bearing Beatty P. Waggoner and others of the Missouri Pacific came to Topeka from Atchison over the Santa Fe last evening. It has since remained here awaiting the arrival of Marshal Neely, who is on his way from Fort Scott on a special train. It is the plan, when he arrives, to gather a force of deputy marshals and start west over the Missouri Pacific to intercept the Commonwealers.
