THE GIRARD COLLEGE.

Important Question as to Admission of Boys.

Special Herald correspondence. PHILADELPHIA, May 11.—The Board of Directors of City Trusts held a meeting here on Wednesday and attempted action having an important bearing on the admission of pupils to Girard College, but as eight of fifteen members of the board were present and a tie vote resulted the matter was postponed until the next meeting.

The discussion occurred over the question of the admission of a boy to admittance to Girard College when he has one or more brothers already in that institution. Three boys, among them Arthur Nelius, of Minersville, were qualified applicants, but their admission was opposed by the board and it then already had three brothers in the college and each of the others had two. The unsettled point is of interest to the many people in the coal region who have boys in the institution.

The arguments against the resolution and the admission were that when the college was taking care of one of a family of orphans it was doing its duty by that family and it was not the object of the will to confine the benefits of the institution to any one family to the detriment of others, but to spread them broadcast, dividing the favors equally among all.
