



Senators Now Earnestly at Work on the Measure.

A VICTORY FOR THE REPUBLICANS.

TARIFF BILL PROGRESS.

They Succeed in Inducing the Democrats to Transfer Building Stone, Etc., from the Free List to the Dutiable List-Republicans Announce Their Belligerency.

WARNINGTON, May 19.-White winged peace howered over the senate yesterday. As a result of the compromise reached at the end of Thursday night's drawn battle the resolution to inaugurate longer hours beginning next Monday was agreed to, and then the senate for the first time since and then the senate for the first time since the thriff debute began settled down to real, earnest work on the schedules. For five beurs the consideration was steadly pushed, the result being that eleven pages of the bill were disposed of --more progress than has been made in the entire three weeks during which the bill has been con-sidered by because has

sidered by paragraphs. The Republicans won their first victory in their efforts to secure higher rates than those granted by the majority. They in-duced the Democrats to take rough building and monumental stone, limestone, freestone, granite, sandstone, etc., from the free list and place them on the dutisble list at seven cents per cubic foot, and to increase the duty on this class of dressed stone from 20 to 30 per cent. ad valorem. The feature of the day was the denial of half a dozen Republican senators theatany agreement had been reached to allow the bill to ultimately come to a vote, and the bold announcement of Messra. Frye and Dolph that they stood ready to go to any length and use any parliamentary methods to defeat the passage of the measure. Soon after the house met it found it-self with fillibuster on its hands, caused by a motion to consider appropriation bills running counter to private bills. The legislative, executive and judicial ap The regulative, executive and junctal appropriation bill was taken up after an agreement was reached to close general debate at 5 o'clock yesterday and that the house would adjourn over Saturday. The discussion of the bill opened up several interesting and important questions among them being the sugar bounty ques tion, the pension frands investigation and the deducting of members pays for ab-sence. Considerable opposition to the mode of docking members was manifested.

Bold Pirates Captured.

QUEBEC, May 19.-The revenue cutter constance, Captain May, just arrived in port, reports quite an adventure. Thurs day morning a suspicious looking craft, supposed to be a smuggler, was sighted some distance below Seven Islands. Chase was at once given and the smuggler was speedily overhauled, but refused to strike her colors and resisted arrest. The bold pirate was, however, finally captured, but ot before blood had been spilled and the mate and boatswain of the Constance had been badly wounded by axes in the hands of the crew. Thirty-eight barrels of whisky and some cases of liquors were found on board. Five men of the smuggler crew were brought in on the Con stance.

Miners Prevented from Working.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., May 19.-A row oc-curred at the Keystone colliery, near Par-sons, yesterday afternoon, which at one time assumed almost the proportions of a riot. The trouble grew out of a strike that took place a week ago, and the im-mediate cause was an attempt upon the part of some of the strikers to return to work. When they appeared at the mins a crowd of Hungarians, numbering twenty five or thirty, set upon them with clubs and stones, 'making them fice for their lives. Two of the men who wanted to go to work were seriously hurt, and the others decided not to go back to work at present.

The Miners Still Determined.

CLEVELAND, May 19.-The miners held a final consultation yesterday, at which it was decided to continue the fight until the operators agree to restore the old scale. President McBride made an address to the delegates, urging them to use only peaceable measures to gain the desired re-sult, and to strengthen their lines by extending organization. The miners hope

to keep up the fight until June 1, when they expect a break to be made among the



The Effect of Legislative Inaction on the Industries.

GREAT RECUPERATIVE POWERS.

Nothwithstanding the Influences Which in Any Other Land Would Cause Dire Disaster the General Soundness of the Commercial World Is Evidenced.

NEW YORK, May 19 .-- R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade says: The obstacles to improvement do not lessen. The strikes of coal miners and coke workers have not ceased, but have caused the stoppage of numerous works this week, an embarrassment to some railroads. The conference at Cleveland exhibited much angry feeling and wider differences than had been expected, and seems to render agreement more distant. Proceedings in the senate do not indicate that the latest form of tariff revision has made speedy final action more probable. Yet the recu-perative force of the country is so great that observers are constantly amazed at the volume of business being transacted. the tonnage being transported, the num-ber of works resuming operation, and the general soundness of trade, notwithstanding influences which in any other land would produce dire disaster. Wheat has sold at 37 cents for May, and

Wheat has sold at 57 cents for May, and 57% cents for July, though western re-celpts have been only 1,215,548 bushels for the week, against 2,313,046 lnat year. Ex-ports were but 791,727, against 2,000,164 bushels last year, and the fact that gold goes instead of wheat at 57 cents or cot ton at 7.19 cents has more weight than the readily brickform re-means at the shall rapidly brightening prospects of the yield next fall.

The soundness of the commercial world is shown in the diminishing importance of failures, the liabilities reported for the second week of May amounting to only \$1,337,538, of which \$1,400,082 were of trading and \$432,606 of manufacturing concerns. The failures this week have been 220 in the United States, against 347 last year, and 24 in Canada, against 140 last year.

Bradstreet's financial review says: In-Bradstreet's financial review says: In-vestment and speculation are still at-tended by uncertainty and hesitation. The market is consequently very restricted and displays no little irregularity in its movements. The past week, however, has developed increased activity and in-terest in the railroad share list, although this consisted almost activity of renewed this consisted almost entirely of renewed and to a certain extent successful profes sional assaults upon values. The weak element in the market continues to be the securities of the bankrupt companies, and the shares which are liable to assessment. In view of the heavy contributions, which it seems necessary to require in many instances, there has been considera-ble liquidation of this class of holdings. The declines thus produced seem to be independent of the pressure which bear ope-rators have exercised on some of the Granger stocks. In the later instance the move ment was instituted in view of the severe cutting of rates throughout the west, and has been continued in the face of a settle-ment of the trouble on the theory that the

decline of wheat makes it impossible for the roads to levy in the future as high charges as in the past. This week is the third in succession in which there has been no material gain in the volume of business and practically no improvement in prospects for trade in the near future. Although pleasant weather has favored retail lines in many directions, jobbers in staple goods have not found a corresponding increase in demand. Continued uncertainty regarding tariff legis lation restricts trading in futures in all staple lines. This is largely responsible for the reduction in the volume of bank clearings.


