

GASTON'S TESTIMONY

The Wire Manufacturer Before the Senate Committee.

HE RECOGNIZED NO SENATORS.

Though He Did Hear a Conversation Regarding Sugar in Mr. Terrett's Room at the Arlington Hotel-There Was Very Little Politics in the Discussion.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—The committee investigating the sugar trust gave out last night the testimony of Walter Gaston, the wire manufacturer of Wilkes-barre, Pa., who occupied the room next to Mr. Terrell at the Arlington hotel, and upon whose statement to a congressman was based the article in the New York Mail and Express which is one of the topics considered by the committee. The article was read to Gaston, and he said:

"With the exception of the fact that I was in the room—that I overheard a conversation on augar, that I told a congress-man next morning from what I heard that I did not believe the Wilson bill would pass, nor any other tariff unless it was a better bill—it is absolutely manu-factured out of whole cloth, absolutely false from beginning to end. In telling this congressman—we had confidential re-lations together for some time—I told him this in pure confidence, without giving him details I mentioned nobody. I sim ply told him that from a sugar conversa tion the night before in an adjoining room I did not believe the Wilson bill would pass, nor any tariff bill unless a much more favorable bill for the various in-dustries of the country were framed. That I will admit."

He then told that upon being awakened he learned from the conversation in the adjoining room that the sugar men were not satisfied with the sugar schedule of fered by the sub-committee of the fluance committee. He did not recognize the voice of any person in the room, although it was those persons who were dissatisfied with the sugar schedule. From the general course of their conversation he was sure they were interested in sugar. He denied that he arose and peeped through the keyhole. The only reason he had to suppose that senators were in the room was the familiarity they displayed with what had been going on in the sub-com-mittee on finance that day. He had never aid to anyone that he recognized the

oices of senators.

It was his understanding that the subcommittee had offered the sugar industry 40 per cent. ad valorem and one-eighth of a cent defferential for refined sugar, and this was unsatisfactory to the men in the room, and from what they said he was sure that the Wilson bill would be de-feated. He was asked concerning many of the statements in the newspapers, and declared most of them absolutely faise in every particular. He knew Terrell was in the room, because some one come in and said: "Good evening, Mr. Terrell." One of the men seemed more familiar with the subject of sugar than the others, and was complimented by the others for his knowl-sdge. There was no politics in this dis-cussion, all sugar, and some social talk.

Asked as to why he thought the bill would be defeated, be said. "The interests of one in tariff matters should be the interest of all, and I knew, or I thought I snew that the sugar men could not get it all, and that it would have to be live and let live, as it is in all those matters Therefore, if the augus men were better taken care of the other schedules would be better taken care of. That was my inference and it was not an unnatural one. Beltzhoover, who at present represents the dis trict in congress, made a bard fight. The district is strongly Democratic, and a nomination is regarded as equivalent to an election.

Italy's Ministry Resigns ROME, June 6.—Premier Crispi has an-ounced the resignation of the Italian ministry in the chamber of deputies. The resignation, he said, had been placed in the hands of the king, who, however, had reserved an announcement of his course in regard to the new cabinet until later.

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TARIFF BILL PROGRESS

The Amended Sugar Schedule Goes Through the Senate.

TO GO INTO EFFECT NEXT YEAR.

Mr. Hill Voted for the Peffer Amendment Envoying Free Sugar, While Irby Was Paired the Same Way-Senstors Sherman and Stewart Refused to Vote.

Washington, June 6.—The compromis amendments to the sugar schedule were all adopted in the senate yesterday, and the pivotal schedule on which the fate of the tariff measure depended went through without change. On the vital amendment to place all sugars on the free list the Democratic line was drawn, Mr. Hill (N. Y.) voting in favor of it and Mr. Irby (S. C.) being paired the same way. But the Republicans were mable to hold their own forces intact, Messrs, Manderson and own forces intact, Messrs. Manderson and Perkins voting against the amendment and Mr. Quay being paired against it, while Messrs. Sherman and Stewart did not vote at all. Only one of the Populists. Mr. Peffer, voted for free sugar, Mossrs. Kyle and Allen, in the final issue, joining with the majority of Democrats against it. The vote on Mr. Jones' amendment, fixing Jan. I as the date on which the sugar bounty repeal should go into effect sugar bounty ropeal should go into effect was carried by 38 yeas to 31 mays. Mr. Peffer's amendment to place all sugar on

the free list was lost by 26 to 37.
Had all the Republicans, with the three
Populists and the two disaffected Democrats, joined hands, sugar, raw and re-fined, would have gone on the free list On all the other amendments offered by the Republicans the majority against them ranged from three to ten. The adoption of the sugar schedule practically insures the passage of the bill at an early date, although it is intimated that the Republicans will make a final stand on the sugar schedule when the bill is reported and considered in the senate.

As adopted the schedule imposes a duty

of 40 per cent ad valorem on all sugars, raw and refined, with a differential duty of one-eighth of a cent per pound on sugars above 16 Dutch standard, and an additional one-tenth of a cent against sugars imported from countries paying an export bounty. It continues the Ha-walian treaty admitting sugar from the Sandwich islands free of duty, and places a duty of two cents per gallon on mo-lasses testing above forty degrees by the polariscope. The schedule goes into effect Jan. 1, 1995, and the bounty is continued

until that date.

After an ineffectual attempt to hav yesterday devoted to private bills, the house continued the discussion of the Brawley bill, the principal speech being made by Mr. Harter (O.). A rule provid-ing for debate under the five minute rule and a vote at 5:30 was brought in by the committee on rules and adopted by the house, but was subsequently amended to allow two hours general debate and a vote today
