

THE TRIAL OF WIMAN. Opening of the Defense in the Great Forgery Trial.

WIMAN'S INTEREST IN THE FIRM.

The Defense Assorts That the Prisoner Alone Was Responsible for the Success of the Mercantile Agency-The Case May Reach the Jury Tonight.

NEW YORK, June 14 .- In the third day's trial of Erastus Wiman for alleged forg-ery several checks drawn by the defendant were presented in wildence and iden-tified by witnesses. The letter of Mr. Wi-man ito Mr. Dun, in which he confesses that he signed the name of E. W. Bull-inger on the back of two checks of Dun's firm was read. In the letter Mr. Wiman pleads for mercy on account of his wife and children.

Then General Tracy arose and made the usual motions for dismissal of the case. This being denied, he then moved that all evidence touching upon the \$135,000 check be straight. evidence fourching upon the \$13,000 check be stricken out, and in substance re-quested the dismissal of the whole of the first count indictment. All this being denied, he then opened by seeking to show that Wiman was a partner in the firm of Dun & Co., and that, as such, his actions were strictly legal, "If at times somewhat roundabout."

roundabout." Then Mr. Boardman opened in his ad-dress to the jury. He prefaced his address by saying that it lay with the jury to de-cide the manner of Mr. Wiman's guilt. This must be shown beyond all peradven-ture, regardless of what views may be re-tained by the court or presecution. "Call this association what you will," said Mr. Boardman, "it cannot be denied that Mr. Wiman was the head and front of the firm of R. G. Dun & Co., so far as roundabout.

Dun. "Mr. Wiman was the real power behind the firm of R. G. Dun & Co. You have seen the smooth and olly Mr. Douglass on the stand. Gentlemen, Lask you whether he would over be equal to running the affairs of this prosperous concern. I ask you how long it would take him to bring the concern's profits up to half a million a year, more than \$1,000 a day, for Mr. Dun, who never bothered himself about the affairs of the concern, but let Mr. Wi

man do it all." Mr. Boardman gave a detailed descrip tion of Mr. Wiman's Staten Island ven-tures, among them the acquisition of the Staten Island ferries, into which Mr. Dun put \$100,000. "I say this," went on Mr. Boardman, "to show that Mr. Wiman kept nothing from Mr. Dun. That he was at all times open and frank and truthful." Then Mr. Boardman dilated upon what Then Mr. Boardinan dilated upon what he called the extraordinary character of the prosecution in this case. "Would you take by the hand a man like Mr. Dun, who gives to the public authorities a paper so sacred and confidential as this let

ter of July 1, 1800? "The prosecution of Wiman dates back to the year 1866, when Mr. Wiman came on here to take the management of the New York office at the earnest wish of Mr. Dun. In order to make my meaning clear, it should be said that Mr. Dun is childless. Mr. Wiman declared that during his time as manager of the commercial agency the firm's profits increased from nothing at first to \$50,000, then to \$100,000, to \$350,000. and by successive jumps to half a million which in round numbers was the no profit of the agency when he was dropped out of it. Speaking to Mr. Dun of his overdrafts, witness had told him that he then owned at least \$600,000 worth of real estate on Staten Island at that time, and that he regarded that as a trust held by him gainst any money he might owe R. G. Dun & Co.


