TARIFF CONFERENCE.

The Republican Members of the Committee Present.

ONLY IN SESSION ABOUT AN HOUR

When An Adjournment Was Taken Until This Afternoon-A General Disagresment Likely to be Reported to Both Houses in a Day or Two.

WASHINGTON, July 18.—The first formulation conference on the tariff bill with all the senate and house members, both Democratic and Republican, present was held yesterday and continued only about an hour. An adjournment was then taken until 3 o'clock this afternoon. The proceedings of the full conference consisted in an effort on the part of the Democra-tic members to enlighten their Republi-can colleagues upon the elements of dis-agreement between the Democratic members of the two houses, without revealing the methods by which they have sought to get together or the details of the pro-

eedings of the Democratic conferences. 4 It had been expected that the Republican conferees would at the outset indulge In some criticism on having been kept out of the conference during its initial stages. But the Republicans had little to say be-youd the formal greetings, and waited until Senator Voorhees, as head of the Democratic conferees, made a somewhat formal and full statement of the situs tion. He said that no discourtesy to the Republicans had been intended. The meetings had not been conference meetings, but had been confined to an effort to bring about some settled policy among the Democratic conferees.

Senator Voorhees added that he was frank to confess that the efforts toward agreement had not proved successful. The features of disagreement were then gone into at considerable length by Mr. Voorhees and his associates. They stated that the sugar, coal, metal and woolen and cotton schedules had been tough bones of contention, but did not give particulars in any case except in that of sugar, with reference to which they stated that the house members had indicated

that the house members had indicated a willingness to grant some duty on that article, but had objected to the differential duty on relined sugar.

On the other articles which had been the basis of disagreement Senator Voorhees and other Democratic members of the conference contented themselves by saying that the Democratic conferees of the two houses had contended, each side for its own bill. This had been especially true on the metal and woolen schedules, true on the metal and woolen schedules the senate amendments to which has been strongly objected to by the Demo cratic house conferces. They said among other special articles in the metal schedule the house members had held out for free iron ore, and for the house rates on lead ore containing silver, cutlery and steel rails. They had also demanded—so it was reported to the full conference free coal. In the general discussion the Republican conferees gathered that sugar, iron ore, coal and woolen schedule, cotton schedule and silver lead bearing ores were the chief questions of disagreement.

The question finally arose as to what would be done now that the full confer-ence had assembled. It was suggested by Senator Aldrich that the bill should be taken up item by item and be considered by Republicans and Democrats, but the point was raised that this appeared to be hardly worth while in view of what the Democrats had just disclosed that there was no prospect of agreement on the main

The meeting yesterday was not marked by any sharp controversy or criticism and only once did the sarcasm of Mr. Reed find atterance. It was when Chairman Wilson, speaking rather personally of the amondment urged by certain Democratic senators, said that it might be well to inform the public of the situation by printing in the tariff bill the names of the senators alongside their respective amendments. To this Mr. Reed responded that the public would probably mistake the tariff bill for a biographical dictionary.

As a result of the meeting the Repub-lican conferees concluded that a general disagreement could be reported to both houses within a few days. There was no distinct statement or proposition to this effect, but it app eared to be the only con clusion to be drawn from what had occurred. Senator Aldrich and Mr. Reed said there would be no disposition on the part of the Republicans to delay a report of disagreement. At the close of today's meeting Chairman Wilson stated that no exact plan was in view for reporting back to congress.
