THE COREAN IMBROGLIO

Alleged Intervention of the United States in the Controversy.

MR. CLEVELAND AS MEDIATOR.

Our President Said to Have Made Representations to China and Japan Looking to a Peaceable Sattlement of Affairs. History of the Incident.

LONDON, July 19.-A dispatch from Ber In to The Chronicle says that the London correspondent of The Vossische Zeiting declares that both Russia and the United States have done their utmost to avert war between China and Japan over Corea. The United States, the correspondent adds, has even exceeded the limits of friendly persuasion over Japan and China. A dis patch from Washington to a news agency here states that President Cleveland has

offered to mediate on the Corean question.

The history of the incident begins with the Corean rebellion, when, upon the ap-plication of the king, the United States sent the warship Baltimore to Chemulpo. Almost simultaneously the Japanese and Chinese governments sent military forces to aid the king in his efforts to stamp out the rebellion. They were successful, and when quiet was restored the Coreans proffered their thanks and suggested a with-drawal of the foreign forces. This was not so easily to be accomplished. The Chinese and Japanese have always been at odds whenever Corea was con-

cerped. However, the Chinese were willing to withdraw if the Japanese would do Rewise, but the latter country discovered; that she had a number of grievances against the Coreans on account of maladministration and making a series of demands, some of which touched the very existence of Corea as an independent nation, Japan announced that her troops would not be withdrawn until these con-

ditions were met.

At this point the attention and interest At this point the attention and interest of other nations were strongly aroused, for it was seen that the peace of all northern Asia was in jeopardy. Great Britain, Russia anp France interposed with pacific ramonstrances; but Japan, the present government of which, it is intimated here, was in such a desperate pass politically that it felt obliged to excite the national feeling as a means of self preservation. Then the United States was drawn into the matter.

the matter.

We have large interests in China an Ja pan, and prospects of greatly enlarging our trade relations, and When United States Minister Dunn, at Tokio, represented the conditions to the state depart-ment it was felt to be not only in our own interest, but for the good of all concerned to reinforce the efforts of the great European powers to prevent a conflict that would surely be disastrous to both sides. Just how far Secretary Gresham went

in his representations to Japan can be learned only when the correspondence is published, but it may be safely assumed that our government has done nothing that would be likely to affront a nation that is not unduly sensitive; nor has it varied from the course of diplomatic usage in the form of its representations. The general policy of the United States in this matter has been in accord with that of Russia and Great Britain.

McKillip Pleads Gullty.

Indianapolis, July 19.—Daniel McKil-lip, one of the coal miners arrested at Fontenal last Thursday on the charge of vio-lating the federal court restraining order by interfering with movements of trains on the Big Four, pleaded guity before Judge Baker in the United States court yesterday. McKillip's plea was a surprise. Thomas Harper, President Debs' attorney, falled to appear for McKillip, as had been expected. The federal officers here believe that McKillip knows more about the Fontenal wreck than he has yet told.

Two Sailors Arrested for Roubery. PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., July 19.—Two sailors belonging to the schooner Achilles were arrested here by a deputy United States marshal from Aleska, charged with robbing Captain Bartles of \$800 while the latter was in jail at Sitka for attempting to break into the government prison to release a Russian woman. Captain Bartles sent the men on board the scheduler to Sitka to get the money to be deposited as bail. They secured the money, stole a boat and escaped. A portion of the money was recovered.

Baseballist Tucker Again Set Upon PHILADELPHIA, July 19.—After returning from yesterday's game, "Tommy" Tucker, the first baseman of the Boston team, was assaulted in front of the Hotel the arrest in Servis of the Sol Disant Hanover by a crowd of enthusiasts who Baron Von Steraberg, chief of the inter-Hanover by a crowd of enthusiasts who were returning from yesterday's game, He received a heavy blow in the mouth. Tucker complained to a policeman, but was ordered into his hotel, and, upon refusing, was locked up in a nearby station house. Later he was released and left town with the club for New Bedford, where they play today.

No Evidence of Foul Play.

WILMINGTON, July 19 .- John McCollom, who was arrested on suspicion of hav-ing caused the death of John Willis, whose drowned body was found floating in the drowned body was found floating in the Delaware river July 1, was discharged after a hearing before Justice McWhor-ter. The evidence failed to show that there had been any violence used towards Willis, or that his death was due to any other cause than drowning. The discharge of William Heintzieman, McCollom's companion, who was arrested in Philadel-phia, will be ordered.

Hospital Threatened by Forest Fires. DULUTH, Minu., July 19.—Forest fires are gaining in the woods back of this city. The smallpox hospital, where there are four convalescents, is now threatened, and all the patients and furniture are being moved. Fires in northern Wisconsin are damaging much timber along the Eastern Minnesota and Northern Pacific roads.

The Government Troops Victorious. AUCELAND, N. Z. July 19.—Advices that have reached here from Apia, the capital of Samoa, are to the effect that a skirmish between government troops and rebels took place on June 29. The former were victorious. The rebels lost twentytwo killed.

WASHINGTON, July 19 .- The proceedings of the full tariff conference yesterday were both brief and formal, consisting merely both brief and formal, consisting merely of a statement by Senator Voorhees to the effect that the Democratic members of the conference had found themselves after another effort unable to find common ground to stand upon, and had decided to recommend a report for a general disagreement upon the bill as a whole. There was no discussion. The house members indicated, though not by formal vots, that they should elect to stand by the house bill, while the senators. Democratic and bill, while the senators. Democratic and Republican, voted not to recede from the

senate amendments.

Mr. Wilson made a brief verbal report
as soon as the house convened this morning. Mr. Catchings, from the committee on rules, thereupon presented a special rule allowing two hours for debate, at the end of which time a vote will be taken on again sending the bill to conference. It is expected that there will be objection to is expected that there will be objection to this rule. Mr. Reed says he advised a full debate, yet he has no objection to limiting it to two hours. Mr. Wilson and Mr. Reed will each control one hour. It is ex-pected that Mr. Wilson will make the main statement of the difficulties which now confront the bill, although his strength may not permit him to make a long sneeth. ong speech. No purpose has been developed as yet to

move special instructions to the commit-tes, as it is said an insistence on the house bill is all the instructions necessary. When the bill is again sent to conference there will be no change in the personnel

of the house committee.

It is learned that agreements were posible on most of the questions, and that the schedules of disagreement which brought about the total disagreement were those covering sugar, metals, iron ore and coal. The differences on manufactured metals resulted mainly from that on iron ore, so that the difference was in fact practically narrowed down to Iron ore, coal and sugar.
