REPORT OF MID-SUMMER TRADE.

The Return of Potters, Pullman Employes, Coke Workers and Miners Have a Good Effect on the Industrial Situation.

NEW YORK, July 21 .--- R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade says; The effects of the two great strikes have not yet entirely worn off, and meanwhile disagree-ment between the two houses of congress has made tariff uncertainties more distinct and impressive. It follows that the customary tests of the condition of pusicustomary tests of the condition of push-mess are less instructive than usual. The financial situation is somewhat less fav-orable, because the exports of gold have been resumed and are \$8,000,000 for the week, but treasury receipts have been \$2,046,391 for customs against \$2,951,574 last year and \$7,474,555 internal revenue, against \$1,070,575 internal revenue, against \$1,070,575 internal revenue.

against \$2,979,518 last year. The extraordinary payments to antici-pate the increase of taxation on whisky are rapidly locking up a large amount of capital and taking from the government part of the expected increase of revenue. while the current loss in customs receipts is largely due to the postponement of imports in expectation of lower duties here-after. Thus the treasury has been gain-

ing in balance, although at the expense of some loss in revenue hereafter. Wheat has been skating on thin ice, with a shance of breaking through and making the lowest record ever known, and has declined three cants for the week. With railroads generally blocked in the wheat delivering districts it is a satisfactory indication that the western receipts are about two-thirds of last year's 2,271,-514 bushels, against 3,028,378 a year ago, while the exports from Atlantic ports are insignificant, only 672,402 bushels, against

2,768,627 last year. Corn has advanced a shade, with no satisfactory reason, for the prospect is szcol-lent for a large yield. A great specula-tion in oats has begun to liquidate, with the customary losses to the wise men who knew all about it. Cotton has declined a fraction, and all indications still point to a material increase of yield. Although there was an increase during

the month of June of nearly a third in the weekly production of pig iron and the weekly production of pig from and the consumption is the manufacture was nearly 20,000 tons per week greater than the output of furnaces, it is questionable whether any further improvement has yet occurred in July. Many of the west-ern establishments were stopped because the blockade of railroads cut off their sup-plies of fuel and have not yet ventred. plies of fuel and have not yet ventured to resume. Others west of Pittsburg have been inactive because the coke strike continues and the limited production scarcely suffices for the need of works near at hand.

The most hopeful sign noted this week is that failures continue comparatively few and not very important. The aggre-gate of liabilities for the twelve days end ing July 12, was \$2,630,306, of which \$1. 009,831 was of manufacturing and \$1,558,-204 of trading concerns, which is decidedly below the average for the past half year. The failures this week have been 235 in the United States against 467 last year

Bradstreets' report says: The disap-pearance of the great railway strike of 1894, the revival of regular freight sched-ules, and the customary movement of produce and merchandise by water and rail, have done much to restore some-thing like the preceding volume of tends thing like the preceding volume of trade. THE TARIFF BILL IN THE SENATE other cheap materials. But the

> The Principal Speeches of the Day Were Made by Measrs, Hill and Vest, the Former Indorsing Mr. Cleveland's Letfor ou the Tariff.

WASHINGTON, July 21 .- Because of a fery small attendance by reason of greater attractions in the senate, the house was able to transact much husiness in short time yesterday. Half a dozen bills were time yesteriay. Haif a dozen bils wore passed without opposition or debate in the hour devoted to the committee on ju-diciary. One was the bill by Mr. W. A. Stone, of Pennsylvania, providing for consular inspection of immigrants and that every immigrant entering the United States must exhibit a correliferate of fit. States must exhibit a certificate of fit-ness signed by the consul of the port from which he satiod.

Another was a bill inspired by the troubles between the late officials of South Carolina and the United States courts over the collection of taxes from railroads in the hands of receivers, which strips the United States courts of control in the matter of state, courts of control in the matter of state, courty and muni-cipal taxes. A third important bill re-vises the whole system of the appoint-ment of United States commissioners making their tenure of office limited, ma torially scaling down their fees and pro-viding that arrested persons shall be brought before the nearest commissioner

or settlement. Most of the day was devoted to this dis Most of the day was devoted to the dis russion of the resolution introduced by Mr. Tucker, of Virginia, to amond the constitution by taking away from con-gress authority over the election of United States senators and empowering the states to prescribe the times, places and manner of holding elections for senators. Before of holding elections for senators. Before a vote was reached the house was com-pelled under the regular order for Friday to take a recess. The night session was devoted to pension business. Yesterday was one of dramatic interest in the Senate, for the fate of the tariff bill of 1894 depended upon the course pursued in the wave branch of courses The

in the upper branch of congress. The friends of the tariff bill wore anxious faces, and more than once during the day feit that the very danger point had been reached. The enemies of the bill at times believed that they would be able to defeat

it. When the adjournment came the sit-nation was still perplexing. The senate proceedings proper were of a peculiar nature in that the debate was carried on entirely by the Democrats, save a brief speech by Senator Sherman and a question by Senator Aldrich. The principal speeches of the day were those of Senators Hill and Vest, though others contributed to the interest of the occasion. Senator Hill's position endors-ing the president in emphatic terms wa one of the most conspicuous incidents of the day. Senator Vest took occasion to talk in plain terms in defense of the right of the senate and house to arrange its conference without executive interference.

His criticism of the president's course and the action of Mr. Wilson was more severe than was expected. He spoke for the finance committee and the position of the conferees.

The action of Senator Vilas in preced-In the action of Semator vinas in preced-ing his speech with a motion to strike out the one-eighth differential on sugar was an additional sensation of a sensational day from the fact that it was probable that the motion would carry. It caused consternation until it was found that the

notion may be declared out of order. The statements of Senator Smith and enator Blanchard were important as indicating that a change in the sugar sched-ule might mean the loss of their votes, while Senator Blanchard states decidedly that he would not vote for the bill if this change was made. Senator Gray's vigor-ous speech was enlivened by a brisk col-loquy with Senator Hill.
