The committee on epidemics reported that there are two cases of typhoid fever and three of measles in the town.

Secretary Scanlan reported that during the past ten days 88 deaths were reported to the board and during the month of July there were 83 deaths.

Dr. S. C. Spalding, who was recently re-appointed a member of the board for a term of five years, was re-elected as president. Mr. T. M. Scanlan and Mr. Edward Miles were re-elected secretary and health officer, respectively, by a unanimous vote.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Immediately after the announcement of the recall of Mr. Gozo Tateno as Japanese minister to this country it was stated that Mr. Kenzo Kaneko had been appointed to this post. This was an error, due, it is supposed, to a mistake in transmission of the name.

THE VIGILANT AGAIN.

She Leaves the Britannia and Sautanita Far Astern.

ENGLISH TRICKS TO DEFEAT HER.

Attempts to Force the American Vessel Into Shallow Water Results Disastrously for the Prince of Wales' Cutter—Beaten at Their Own Game.

COWES, Isle of Wight, Aug. 7.—The race yesterday between the Vigilant, British-built and Sautanita, a distance of about fifty-five miles, was sailed in an excellent breeze, with the result that the two English yachts were left far astern. The time at the finish was Vigilant, 5 h., 6 min., 15 sec.; Britannia, 5 h., 14 min., 30 sec.; Sautanita, 5 h., 48 min., 15 sec. Vigilant consequently won by 5 min., 12 sec., without counting time allowance of 2 min., 22 sec., which she allows Britannia.

Captain Hall, of the Vigilant, said to an Associated Press representative after the race:

"It is quite true that the Britannia tried to hold us at the start, evidently in order to allow the Sautanita to get ahead. In fact, they were trying to bring us about. When one got slightly ahead the other immediately tried to hold us, and this led to our running into the shore more than once. The Sautanita only led on the run to Bembridge. Directly we turned the point and started to reach for St. Catherine's Point we began to gain and soon passed her. The Britannia also came up, and then commenced a series of tacking matches. The Britannia was towing hard and prevented us from passing, continually bearing down on us and keeping us in shore."

"Ultimately, when we had just passed Ventnor, we tried to pass the Britannia to leeward, but failed. Then we decided to pass her to windward, whatever the risks might be. We succeeded, and the Britannia was pressed in shore and rubbed her bottom. Later on the Britannia again tried the same game when we were close together. We were determined not to be jockeyed in this fashion, and as both were game it was simply a case of which would go farthest in shore. As the Britannia draws three feet more water than the Vigilant she went on the rocks. The Vigilant also bumped, being nearer the shore, but I do not think that she suffered seriously."

Captain Hall concluded significantly: "If the Britannia continues these tricks there will be a yacht or two less to race these regattas." Captain Carter, of the Britannia, told the correspondent that his boat grazed the rocks three times during the race. A diver has since examined her bottom and reports a part of her keel and copper had been torn away. Nevertheless she is tugging today.

It recites that the committee has just returned from extensive visits through the section through which the hot winds blow, and that the committee explains that it has reason to believe from all it has been told that thousands of families will, either starve, emigrate or be fed by charity unless the people as a whole provide for them.
