Lawrence, another Truncesses valley county, goes for Kolb by only 1,250, as against 2,135 before. Limestone goes for Kolb by 153, mgainst 1,685 in 1892. Tallapous goes for Kolb by 690, against 2,449 in 1892. In Cherokee his maiority falls off 200

"The frauds of this year are more no-torious and shameful than those of 1898. For the purpose of deceiving the public they have, to some extent, been shifted. The returns as reported from Lowndes county indicate frauds exceeding anything ever before known in the history of this


