## EZETA STILL AT SEA.

Eitch in the Arrangements for the Fugitive's Arrest.

A CONFLICT OF AUTHORITIES.

The United States Marshal, Who Represents the State Department, Has No Authority to Demand the Services of a Government Vessel.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.-The singular international complications involving the liberty of General Ezeta and his fellow refugees, which has been prolific of opera bouffe sensation, developed a new tings of conflicting authority yesterday. War-rants were finally issued for the arrest of the refugees, but the local federal authorities got tangled up in government tape tud the warrants could not be served. United States Marshal Haldwin, armed

United States Marshal Buldwin, armed with the authority of the federal courts, ast out to have the refugees brought within the jurisdiction of the law, but he rau up against Captain Hawaison, commanding Mare Island navy yard, who declared he had no legal authority to furnish transportation for the marshal, and



MISS WRIGHT. GENERAL EZETA. he refused to place that official on the Bennington. Without the assistance of the navy department the marshal could not reach the gunboat. The law allows the marshal but \$2 for serving each war-rant, and under this compensation he could not afford to hire a tugboat. Furthermore, Captain Thomas, of the Ben-nington, has strict orders to receive no one on board his ship but accredited naval

one on board his saip out accredited havai officers from Mare Island. Under these conditions the United State marshal must have the assistance of the naval authorities if he shall ever arrest the culprits of whom he is in pursuit. The marshal and Captain Howison are in tele-graphic communication with their supe-rior officers at Washington, and if they succeed in establishing harmony between the departments of the governments which they represent it is probable that the navy department will bring the refugees into the United States.

Judge Morrow, of the United States district court, issued the warrants for the arrest of the refugees. Yesterday the written authority from Secretary of State Gresham was placed in the hands of Judge Morrow by Consul Calderon, the San Salvadorean representative at this

The papers call for the extradition of The papers call for the extradition of Antonic Ezeta, Leon Bolanes, R. Jaccinto Caloche, Juan Cienfuegos and Florencio Bustamente. The accused are charged with being criminals and fugitives from justice. It is charged that on June 9, 1894, on the public road leading from the town of New Salvador to La Liberated, one Thomas Camnas, a teamster who was driving along the road, was shot and murdered by Antonio Ezeta and Juan Cienfuegos. Ezeta and his companion were then fleeing from their pursuers.

Cienfueges. Ezeta and als companion were then fleeting from their pursuers. It is also charged that on June 4 Ezeta entered the International Bank of El Salvador and Nicaragua and assaulted Rose Reuis and Eberesto Ambroxi and robbed

marry Miss Ida Dent Wright, an American girl. About a year ago, while Miss Wright was living in Salvador, General Rafael Guiteras and others started a revolution to overthrow the Ezeta govern-ment. Guiteras and nearly a score of other conspirators were captured and sentenced to death. The day they were sen-tenced Miss Wright became the betrothed of General Exets and pleaded so hard for the lives of the computators that they were set free. Now Guiteras is president of Salvador, and if he succeeds in induc-ing the United Stases to surrender the fugitive he will be executed in short order.

BERLIN, Aug. 23.—The officials of the Japanese legation here state that the mar-ftime court at Shanghal, which has been investigating the sinking of the transport Kow Shing, has prenounced in favor of the Japanese in that affair, and that Admiral Fremantle, the British commander, has therefore advised his government that a claim for damages would be useless.

His Fight for the Nomination Sought by Mr. Breckinridge.

A MOST BRILLIANT DENUNCIATION

Judge Kinkead, for Years a Neighbor of the Kentucky Orator, Bitterly Assails the Congressman in a Sprech Delivered Before Twenty Thousand People.

LEXINGTON, Aug 23.—Twenty thousand copie, the flower of Ashland congresonal district, attended the Owens bar secue here yesterday. Preparations had seen made to enter ain 15,000 and the probeen made to enter am 15,000 and the pro-visions fell far short of supplying all. The speakers were Kon. W. G. Owens, Hon. G. W. Lockhart, of Bourbon county, Judge George B. Kinkead, Judge Jere R. Morton and Professor C. F. N. Albert, of Lexington. There were 5,000 ladies pres-ent, and the affair was a magnificent up-heaval of the time honored. Ashiand dis-rict against being layous progressed in trict against being longer represented in congress by W. C. P. Breckinridge.

The speeches all teemed with the most scathing denunciations of Breckinridge and were the most sensational yet spoken against him. Judge Kinkead, for years a neighbor of Breckinridge, was exception-ally severe in appealing for Mrs. Black-burn's defense and Breckinridge's retire-ment. He said:

"Breckinridge declares his opponents are throwing stones at him made of lies, yet he does not tell what lies are being told. He has been charged with the most hideous offenses in public, but he has not denied them. How absurb for Colonel Breckinridge to charge hat his opponents are lying about him. Review the long list of crimes, admitted and proved, which during his life made up his character. Think for a moment of Colonel Breckinridge inflamed with virtuous indignation at the utterances of a lie.

"Review the life that he himself dis-closes. Picture the chosen orator, enveloped in a cloak of sanctity, as he appears through the long series of years before august religious orders. See him again in the roll of morality and virtue, as he points the true course to the little immates of the Female seminary, and follow him through nine long years of secret infamy and vice. Meet him, a husband and a father, and let him conduct you, as he does in his testimony, from the home he should have guarded to the brothel he

should have shunned.
"See him land in the city of his home "See him land in the city of his home and go with him through the disgusting details of his own testimony in that first visit with his cyprian to that brothel in this town. With what brazen forehead did he leave this place and seek the society of his home, and of what material is the fibre of his heart that, hastening through his meet, he hied himself again to the degrading meeting.
