There is an improvement in the demand There is an improvement in the definant for money at Boston, New York and Chicago, but rates are not as high as usual at the season, nor is the supply of commercial paper as large. Northwestern wheat carriers have arranged for necessary funds with Chicago banks at 5 per cent.

cent. The relatively more satisfactory business situation south than elsewhere is in-dicated by our reports from Nashville that jobbers are surprised and pleased at the favorable financial situation of south-ern merchants. Baltimore merchants

have made like reports, and add excep-tionally good collections.

A striking feature at the west comes from Chicago, where the volume of bush-ness to all mercantile lines has increased, especially in dry goods, the total for the week being the heaviest for the scason, notwithstanding conservative purchasing notwithstanding conservative purchasing in that marked by northwestern merchants. This is duplicated at St. Louts, where there has also been a larger volume of sales, both by jobbers and manufacturers, the total for August being equal to that in 1892. Omaha reports that Nebraska needs a good deal of rain, and that trade with jobbers is fair only. Milwankeedhas experienced a decided improvement in demand for goods and money, while St. Paul reports that leas of life and destruction of villages, and property by fire have checked purchases in that market. Minneapoils amounces that the recent good volume of business there is holding its own.

is holding its own.

There is a contrast between Louisville and Cincinnati, the former reporting many visiting buyers, increased sales and manufacturers of woolens anticipating deliveries, the latter reporting that distribu-tion of dry goods alone shows a gain this week. Improvement to some lines and a moderate volume of business in others is
