THE WAR IN THE EAST

The Power of Vicery Li Hung Chang Steadily Waning.

A REIGN OF TERROR AT TIENTEIN.

The Savage Soldiery Are Plundering and Mattreating the Wretched Populace, and Native Merchants Are Fleeing in Order to Save Their Lives.

LONDON, Sept. 12.-A dispatch from Shanghai states that the power of Vice-roy Li Hung Chang is steadily waning. His few influential friends are doing their best for him at Pekin, but it is not likely that they will be able to avert his down-

that they will be nile to avert his downfall. Every day's delay in providing the promised victory over the Japanese now adds to Li Hung Chang's danger.

The dispatch adds that the block in moving the Chinese troops into Corea continues. Everything has been thrown into confusion. The reinforcements from the more remote provinces en route to Tientsin are at a standstill and are terrorizing the cities in which they are laited. These reinforcements are mostly halted. These reinforcements are mostly undisciplined hordes, who are not under the control of their nominal leaders. A the control of their nominal leaders. A reign of terror prevails even in Tlentsin. The savage soldiery are plundering and maltreating the wretched populace, and not merchants are fleeing to Tlentsin in order to save ther lives. Trade is at a complete standatill, and misery is general. The French minister has formally protested against the action of the Chinese in boarding a French mail steamer on Saturday last.

A letter from the resident at Seoul states that a large military hospital has been erected on the beights, and that numbers of invalid Japanese are treated there. The building is crowded with pa-tients. It is reported that constant con-flicts are taking place between the out-

THE JAPAN-COREAN TREATY.

Minister Kurino Thinks It Will Prove Highly Advantageous to Corea.

Washington, Sept. 12.—Mr. Kurino, the Japanese minister, talked to an Asso-ciated Press reporter today regarding the new treaty between Japan and Corea.

"We have nothing but the announce-ment of the treaty," he said, "but my in-ference from its terms is that it will prove highly advantageous to Corea. There has existed there under Chinese adspices the most corrupt system of government known. The constant intrigues of China here have been a threat to the peace of he cast. The Japanese government has lesired the settlement of the question only

for the peace of the east.
"With the assurance of autonomy to Cores which is the design of this treaty there will be opportunity for great im-provements in her system of government, internal administration and other affairs Aiready she has advanced from the condition of the rule of an individual influ-enced by China, and has a cabinet of six members and a prime minister, to whom the ruler looks for advice and guidance. This change was made under advice of

Mr. Kurino said he did not think the treaty could be called a step towards a peaceful estilement with China, as China peacetal settlement with China, as China was tenacious, on sentimental grounds, of her claim of suscendinty.
