IMMENSE SLAUGHTER.

The Chinese Defeated in an Engagement at Ping Yang.

THOUSANDS REPORTED KILLED.

The Battle Rag-d All Day Saturday and During the Night Until the Japanese Succeeded in Forming a Cordon Around the Enemy's Works.

LOSING, Sept. 18.—A dispatch from Small says a front battle has been fought at Ping Yang between the Chinese and Japanese to gos, in which the Chinese were uttrive costed. The Chinese loss is estimated at 2,300 killed, wounded and taken primmers. Among those captured by the Japanese are several of the Chines by the Japanese are several of the Chinese commanding officers, including General Tso Fung, commander in chief of the Manchurian army, who was severely wounded. The Japanese loss is only thirty killed and 270 wounded, including eleven officers. Most of the casualties among the Japanese occurred during the first day's fighting, and very few were the result of the night attack.

The Japanese forces are in active pur-suit of the fugitives, who have thrown away their arms and readily yield them-

selves prisoners.

A dusultory war may be carried on fo some time to come, but unless China shall succeed in getting another army into the peninsula Corea will undoubtedly remain in possession of the Japanese.

On Thursday a Japanese column from Pong-San quade a reconnoissance in force, drawing the fire of the Chinese forts, and thus ascertained their position. The column then fell back in good order, with little loss. By Friday night all the Japanese were in position for a combined attack upon the enemy. The battle was opened on Saturday at daybreak by a Japanese cannoade of the Chinese works,

opened on Saturday at daybreak by a Japanese cannoade of the Chinese works, which was continued without cossation until afternoon, the Chinese responding. At about 2 o'clock a body of infantry was thrown forward by the Japanese, and maintained a rifle fire upon the enemy until disk. Throughout the day only the Pong San column was engaged. The Chinese defences had suffered greatly, but the losses on either side were small, both the Chinese and Japanese having taken advantage of all the shelter available. The Japanese treeps, however, ind gained some advanted positions. The fring continued as intervals during the night, and in the meantime two Japanese flanking columns had formed a cordon aromat the Chinese.

At 3 o'clock in the meantime two Japanese flanking columns had formed a cordon aromat the Chinese.

At 3 o'clock in the merning an attack was made by several of the Japanese columns simultaneously and with admirably precision. The Chinese lines, which were so strong in front, were found to be weak in the rear, and here the attack was a perfect success. The Chinese were completely taken by surprise, and were thrown into a panio. Hundreds were until down, and those who escaped death, finding themselves surrounded at everypoint, broke and fled. Half an hour after the attack was opened the position at Ping Yang was in possession of the Japanese. It is estimated that 10,000 Chinese soldiers were engaged in the battle. The Japanese captured luminence stores of provisions, munitions of war, and hundreds of colors.
