A PUGITIVE FOR THIRTEEN YEARS

His Escape from Washington with a Woman Who Afterward Deserted Him. Reeping an Old Book Store in New York When Arrested-Stell \$300,000

New York, Sept. 25.—Captain Heary W. Howgate, formerly chief of the weather bureau in Washington, who was disbursing officer as well, was attracted in this city yesteriay on the charges of forgery and the embezzlement of \$550,000, committed in 1878 and 1870. The arrest is the result of a serial which has accorded the attention of the United States secret pervice for over thirteen years.

After having searched nearly the whole dountry for Howgate, ex thief Drummond received information that the fugitive was a dealer in old hooks and pamphi lets in this city. Every book store was visited by detectives, without success. Finally an officer was detailed to watch the nuction sales for Howgate. About two weeks ago it was suspected

About two weeks ago it was suspected that the fugitive was keeping an old book store in the basement of No. 80 Fourth avenue under the name of Harry Williams. A clerk in the war department at Washington, who had been associated with Howgate in the weather bureau, came to this city and identified him. When arrested Howgate admitted his identity. He could not furnish ball, and was taken to Ludlow street jail. He will be taken to Washington this evening.

Howgate was, when he fled from Wash-

Howgate was, when he fied from Washington, an active, black haired man in the prime of life. He is now 60 years old, bent and broken, with gray hair and beard. The story of Howgate's exposure and of his relations with a woman named Nettis

Burrill caused a great sensation at the

time.

For several years he had led a double domestic life in Washington. But a few squares away from the home that contained his devoted wife and the daughter who was to cling to him so determinedly in the dark hours to come he supported a woman, Nettle Burrill, in luxurious style. When the crash come and the exposure of Howgate's dishonesty was followed by

of Howgate's dishonesty was followed by the discovery of his domestic duplicity few of his old friends turned from him. At the jail he was treated with more con-sideration than ordinary mais factors. He was so utterly opposed to using the common bath ubs in the jail that his kind hear of guardians relaxed the rules of the institution to the extent of allowing the captain to visit his residence on Thir teenth street, in order to indulge in Javatory inxuriance, on April 12, 1882. The officers remained in the sitting room while

Howgate went up stairs for his bath. It is said that Miss Howgate, who pos It is said that Miss Howgate, who pos-sessed an exquisite voice, sang to the guardians of her father and made time pass so pleasantly that an hour elapsed before they awakened to a proper realiza-tion of what they were there for. They asked Miss Howgate to call her father, she was gone a long time, and then came back pale and excited. She could find her father nowhere, she said. They searched the house, and then rushed out and gave the alarm. Captain Howgate by this time and two hours' start. had two hours' start.

It is thought he was steaming down the river below Alexandria before his daugh ter had finished singing. He escaped by going out of the rear of the house, when he was supposed to go to the bath room and, going out into the blind alley in the rear, turned into the exil running out to

rear, thread into the exit running out to the street, where a carriage containing Nettle Burrill was awaiting him.

A search was immediately made for tim, but he was not apprehended, al-th sigh it was notorious that communica-tion was readily established with him, when his friends found it necessary, for months after his departure.
