Fifty Vessels Wrecked on New Foundland's Coast.

GREAT LOSS OF LUPE PROBABLE.

Thirty Lives Lost at St. Pierre Miquelo Alone-No Assistance Could be Rendered the Shipwreeked Sailors from the Shore Bodies Washed on the Benefi,

St. John's, N. F., Oct. 11.—A northeast gale of exceptional force swept over this island Tuesday night. The storm was very severe at St. Pierre, Miqueion, where thirty lives were lost and great damage was done. A very heavy sea was running in the harbor. All the vessels at anchor there put out extra anchors and took other greasures to outcide the gale, but notwithstanding this the martime casualties were many. Not less than fifty vessels dragged their anchors or parted their cables and were thrown upon the shore. Every effort made to keep off shore was fruitless, the gale blowing with such tromondous fury that even storm convess could not be set. some of the doomed vessels were thrown ashore in very exposed places, and the great seas, breaking over them, soon pounding them to pieces.

No assistance could be rendered the ship-

No assistance could be rendered the ship-wrocked men from the shore. A number of them, who jumped overboard and at-tempted to reach the shore by swimming, were drawned, while others were swept into the son by the waves combing over their vessels, and were not seen again the "Il that bodies were past upon the beach till their bodies were cast upon the beach

The wreeked vessels were part of the fishing fleet that had put into St. Pierro from the banks to repair damages they had sustained during the heavy storm of Sept. 30.

Altogether there were nearly 300 vessels at the port, not a single one of which es-caped without sustaining some damage. Several of the fleet are missing, and grave fears are entertained that they foundered during the night.

Long Branch Hotels Wrecked.

LONG BRANCH, Oct. 11.—The storm dam-ge here is great. About 100 feet of pilling of the new fron pier was washed out. The outlinead between the Brighton and Grand View hotels is badly wreeked. A cut of about twenty-five feet was made in the bluff on the east end property. About twenty-five feet of the West End hotel was blown off, and the old Oliver cottage adjoining was unroofed. So also were the cottages of H. H. Painter, of Washington, and E. M. Simffer, of New York. Many bathing houses were washed out to sea.

Rescued by Life Savers

ATLANTIC CITY, Oct. 11.—The three masted schooner Lurena Reed, of Somer's Point, N. J., Captain Morris Ingersoll, bound from Jersey City to English Creek, laden with coal, stranded abreast of the Ocean City life saving station, and will prove a total wreck. The crew took to the rigging as soon as the vessel struck, and were taken off four hours later by the life saving crew. A terrible sea was running at the time the vessel went on, and the life-best could not be launched until the storm

Few Fatalities on New England's Coast. Boston, Oct. II.—The hurricone and rain storm which struck the New England const during Tuesday night, and which passed over Boston yesterday, has gone to the northeast, and last night its center was just northeast of Portland, Me. The wind, which has veered to eastward, has only alightly decreased in velocity.
