

Committee Appointed to See if There is a Leak in the Breastwork of the Davis' Run Reservoir.

Contractor McAdam asked that Coun cil have the concrete work at Fowler's Run reservoir inspected and arrange ments be made for the borough to take the work off his hands. The borough surveyor was authorized to measure the

A Prisoner Parts With a Constable Without an Adleu.

A CASE OF EMBEZZLEMENT.

John W. Goff Charged With Taking Over \$500 of the Singer Machine Company's Money.

John W. Goff, late agent for the Singer Sewing Machine Company with headmarters at Tamaqua, is a fugitive from ustice and stands charged with having mbezzled \$544 belonging to the company The case has been shielded from public ity, but the accused man's escape fron the constable while in custody made a leak in the secrecy which has brought ou the facts.

C. J. Quinn, the general agent for the machine company with headquarters here, and Constable Thomas Tosh went down to Tamaqua on Wednesday and Goff was placed under arrest on Quinn's complaint. The trio arrived here late Wednesday night and it was decided to let the hear ing go over until yesterday morning. Mr. Quinn felt some compassion for the acused agent and prevailed upon the con table not to put the man in the lockup but keen him at his house. The office finally consented, the prisoner giving every assurance that he would not at empt to evade the law. He was given a epirate room in Tosh's house.

At about six o'clock yesterday morning Mrs. Tosh heard descending footsteps or the stairway. Tosh jumped from bed and hurriedly dressed hamself, but when he got down stairs the bird had flown and could not be traced in the neighborhood. He is still missing.

Goff has acknowledged the embezzlement and said he used the money for the support of his family. He is about 30 years of age and has a wife and two children, who live at Tamaqua. Goff has resided at that place about a year and formerly resided at Scranton and Wilkes
