# THE WRECKED WAIRAPA

Stories of the Disaster Told by Survivors.

**STRUCK ON A ROCKBOUND COAST.**  
A Brave Steward Swam to the Shore with a Life Line, and by the Aid of This Line Over a Hundred Were Rescued—Thrilling Experiences.

ACKLAND, N. Z., Nov. 2.—The survivors of the wreck of the steamer Wairapa tell thrilling stories of the wreck. Second Officer Clark says that a thick fog set in at noon Sunday, obscuring everything. The shock of the stranding awakened the passengers, and many of them rushed from their cabins in only their night clothing, making their way as quickly as possible to the deck. The sea was then making a clean breach over the after part of the steamer, and as the frightened passengers came on deck many of them were carried overboard before they had a chance to catch hold of anything to save themselves.

When daylight came it was found that the steamer had struck at the foot of a precipitous cliff that loomed several hundred feet above the vessel. To effect a landing on the shelving places of the cliff was a most difficult and dangerous undertaking.

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# DENOUNCED IN COURT.

Serious Charge Against a High New York Official.

**SAID TO HAVE ACCEPTED A BRIBE.**

A Former Inspector of the Excise Department Declares on Oath That Commissioner Andrews Accepted \$500 for Promoting a License—He Denies the Charge.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Yesterday's session in connection with the Lexow investigation was the appearance of Mrs. Hermann on the stand. This was not sensational on account of testimony for the witness was excused immediately after saying she appeared of her own free will, but because of the intrigues indulged in by the representatives of the committee to secure Mrs. Hermann's presence.

As soon as Justice Poole withdrew his charges of perjury against Mrs. Hermann in Jersey City she was discharged, and representatives of the Lexow committee asked her if she desired to go to New York and testify voluntarily. She replied that she did, and was taken to the ferry in a carriage. There an officer appeared and joined the party, armed with a warrant charging Mrs. Hermann with criminal contempt of court, which was to be served in case she changed her mind. Senator Daly, the witness' counsel, knew nothing of her departure from the jail, and said an hour before she left that she would never appear before the committee.

Early in the day Commissioner Sheehan was excused with the understanding that he should appear before the committee when summoned, but that he would not be called upon this week.

Detetive Dennis was called to the stand during the day to subpoena the notorious Mrs. Charles, but was told she was absent from the city.

The clerk of the Hotel Torloni, on the corner of Lexington avenue and Thirtieth street, was called. He admitted that Mrs. Charles owned the hotel, although the license was in another name.

Moss Huntton, superintendent of the National Ice company, said that when Policeman Carey was about to be appointed the prospective patrolman had borrowed \$300 from him. He had given a check for the money. Policeman Carey told a disconnected story of having borrowed the \$300 to give his father, a farmer in New Hampshire.

Edgar H. Tomlinson, former chief inspector of the excise department, testified that a friend of his asked him to secure by his influence a license for Mrs. Charles. The witness said he used his influence to obtain a license and admitted that he told the woman she would have to take a license out in a different name. He said Mrs. Charles called and saw his wife.

Mrs. Tomlinson was called and told a straightforward story of Mrs. Charles seeking her husband's influence through her. Mrs. Charles on her third visit gave Mrs. Tomlinson \$500 to secure a license. The witness said she gave this money to her husband, and they went to the excise board. Her husband went into the commissioners' room.

"I stood outside," said she, "but through the door I saw Commissioner Andrews. When my husband came out the \$500 was gone, and he said the license would be granted."

Mr. Tomlinson again took the stand and caused a sensation by saying he went into Commissioner Andrews' room and gave him \$500.

"Are you positive that you paid Mr. Andrews, who is now street cleaning commissioner and sits there \$500?"

"Yes, positive. I have known him for thirty years."

Commissioner Andrews was sitting a few feet from the witness and right before the witness. When accused he turned pale.

"That \$500 was a bribe?" asked Senator O'Connor.

"That witness nodded his head.

"Did you receive any of the \$500?" asked Senator Bradley.

"No, sir," replied the witness, positively.

"Do you entertain any hard feelings toward Commissioner Andrews?" asked Senator O'Connor.

"Yes, I have a good reason to do so," said the old man, with a touch of bitterness in his voice.

"Still, your feelings would not lead you to swear falsely?" queried Senator Pound.

"The witness shook his head and turned his face to Mr. Goff, who asked:

"That \$500 had nothing to do with the regular license fee?"

"No, sir."

"Your feelings prompted you to come forward?" asked Senator O'Connor.

"Yes!"

Then the witness straightened up in the chair and looked squarely at Mr. Goff and said:

"I have told the truth. I am now in the employ of the Western Union Telegraph company for thirty years on and off. I am an old war telegrapher."

Commissioner Andrews was shifting nervously on his seat during the witness' accusations. He at last arose and said: "In common decency I demand an opportunity to be heard and deny under oath taking that \$500."

Mr. Goff said the commissioner could take the stand today, and the investigation was then adjourned.
