### NICOLAS BRIDE-ELECT

How Mrs. Reese Became a Convert Her Formal Reception Into the Orthodox Greek Church.

SHE IS NOT TO DRAVE RUSSIA.

It Is Now Asserted That the Royal Marriage May Take Place Immediately After Alexander's Funeral-Report That the Dead Czar Was Poisonetle

LIVADIA. Nov. 3.—The Grand Duke Alexis, brother of the late Czar Alexan-der, and the governor and mayor wel-comed the Prince and Princess of Wales

last night. Czar Nicolas has conferred the decora tion of the Order of St. Anne in diamonds on Professor Leyden, the German physi-cian who attended the late czar. Professor Leyden has started on his return to Germany.

Princess Alix has been formally received into the orthodox church. The ceremony took place in the chapel of the imperia palace. She received the title of grand duchess in Russia, Biagovernaja Velikaja Knagina. After the ceremony of con-fession she received the orthodox sacra-ment. The ritual observed required no denunciation of her former faith. The priest merely asked the princess to express her belief in the Trinity, and then to re-peat the dogmas of the orthodox faith. She did so and was then led by a priest into the church and up to a table on which were vessels containing consecrated oil. In the meantime a choir was singing Psalms. The princess knelt before the table. After the offering of prayers and the singing of hymns the priest said: "Arise, my beloved, arise in the fear of God."

The princess stood up and said: "I vov to remain steadfast in the orthodox Cath-olic church to my last breath. I yow that I acknowledge this faith and rejoice in obeying its laws. As a sign of this sincere yow, which comes from my heart, I kiss the cross of the Saviour, Amen." Then she knelt and the priest gave abso-

Marion.

After numerous hymns and prayers, in which all the members of the czar's family were named, the priest anointed the princess with consecration oil on the temples. eyes, nose, lips, ears, hands and feet. After ward he touched these parts with a sponge dipped in holy water.

He then proclaimed the princess' lawful onversion to the Russian orthodox church and exhorted those present to pray for her It is now stated that Grand Duke Alexis Michaelovitch, who some years ago was disgraced and banished to the Caucasus disgraced and banished to the Cancasus, was not refused permission to see the late czar, as it was said at the time, and receive his forgiveness. The grand duke is suffering with consumption, and when he arrived he was too ill to land from the steamer on which he was traveling. His brother, Grand Duko Alexander, his brother's wife and Grand Duchess Xenia, went on board the steamer to meet him. In the afternoon he sailed for San Remo. In the afternoon he sailed for San Reme

It is now said that Princess Alix will not leave Russia after the funeral. She will go to Moscow on a visit to her sister Grand Duchess Sergius, and her marriage to Nicolas may take place after the funera of Alexander.

Chinamen Fleeing Before Their Conquerera.

MARCHING ONWALD TO MOUNDER.

White the Deported Capture of Port Arthat is tre-catigued, Other Japanese Successes Show That Their Advarsaries Are Basidly Weakening

YOROBANA, Nov. E-Advices receive bere from the front show that there has here from the front show that there has been heavy fightling in the country just north of Port Arthur. The dispatches re-ceived are based and are silent on some points. It appears that Field Marshal Oyenn divided his forces. While one di-vision landed on the east const of the peninsula, north of Tallenwan, another division was demoned with orders truffeed a harding near Kinghay and to present a landing near Kinchow, and to procee thence and join the main body of the thence and join the main body of the army. This operation was a complete success. The Japanese oncountered no Chinese warships, and the transports reached Kayenko and disembarked troops, guns, horses and munitions in safety. Kinchow, which is a walled town and which was believed to be held by a large garrision, was immediately attacked. The outer defress were corrict by the Japan-

outer defenses were carried by the Japan-ese after a few hours fighting. The Chinese made little further resistance, and the Japanese were seen masters of the place. In the meantime the Japanese fleet
