# THE DEFEAT OF HILL

Larger Than Most Sanguine Ropublicans Predicted.

TAMMANY COMPLETELY ROUTED.

Wheeter, the Leader of the Belling Dem ocrats, Gets Over Twenty Thousand Votes. Twenty-three Republican Congressmen Elected Strong's Big Vote for Mayor.

New York. Now 7.—The Republicans have carried New York state by estimated pluralities ranging from 180,000 to 180,000. These figures represent the probable plurality of Levi P. Moeron, rep., for governor, over David B. Hill, dem., based upon the vote of Now York city and Brooklym. complete and returns from more than of complete and returns from more than one-half of the election districts above the Harlam river. The total vote for the two leading candidates is considerably in ex-cess of that polled for Plower and Fassort for governer in 1841, in addition to which is the vote cast this year for Everett P. Wheeler, ind. dom., which will exceed 20,000.

The tromondous Republican sweep in the city and state, it is estimated, has elected twenty three Republican congressments gain of eight over the present represents tion in congress. It was the expressed be lief of those who were conducting the compaign for the Democrats in the state that depreciated majorities below the Har lem for the party there would be offset by increased majorities above the river's bank for the Democracy. The most sanguine expected that the Democratic party, with Senator Hill at its head, would at peration from the vote given for Maynard in 1893. In place of all anticipated results comes a sweep of such proportions and from every quarter beyond the highest claims made by the Republicans.

From pluralities ranging from \$5,000 to 120,000 in the district below the Harlem for the Pernoceratic party the Republican party turns the city vote into 21,000 plurality for its state candidates. In all the Democratic estimates given on the eve of election it was contended that the Democratic plurality below the Harlem would be at least 55,000. The surprises are not centined to this change of votes, but an analysis shows that Senator Hill will ron analysis shows that Senator Hill will run behind even the vote of Maynard, while In the state he fell below the vote cast for

Governor Flower in 1891,

An analysis of such figures as are now obtainable shows that the Republican party alone gained by the increased regi-tration, for Mr. Morton's vote in all of th up country districts show large gains ove the Fassett vote of 1801. In the cities th have been detrimental to the Democrats.
The vote in Albany county was one of the many surprises of the election. For years Albany county on state or nations

Issues has been looked upon as a relial Democratic stronghold, good for from 1.00 to 2,000 Democratic majority. The Democratic eratic managers, in view of this fact and that it is also the home of Senator Hill land it is also the home of Senator Hill, leoked for a majority of not less than 2,500. They felt-confident that Senator Hill would be given a handsome vote, as Judges Maynard carried the county by a normal Democratic majority, notwithstanding the Republican trend in other portions of

the state.

In Mouroe, with its Republican city of Rockestor, the natural Republican pinnality was almost doubled, late figures giving Morton 5,000, where in 1801 the same county only gave to Fassett 3,800. Remassalaer county, the home of Senator Marghry, held as closely to the Democratic borners) one as any in the state. The county only fell off about 800, where its neighbor, Albany county, lost at least 2,600. Erie county repeated its record of last year by giving the usual Republican

majorities.
Otsego county doubled for Morton the majority it gave Harrison and trobled that it gave Fassett. Cheming held protty closely to its normal vote, especially in Elmira City, St. Lawrence county crawled up over 2,000 on its Fassett vote, in favor of Morton. Westchester falls into line with a big majority for Morton, and Ni agara county trebles its Fassett plurality.

The results of the aweeping victory are more far reaching than simply the election of the Republican state ticket. While the returns are very incomplete in constitu tional amendments, it is highly probable cording to the first returns, that all o according to the first returns, that all of them are adopted. The percentage of losses as compared with the vote for the head of the ticket is not nourly so large as it was supposed to be, and the result is, therefore, that the legislature will consist of 50 senators and 150 assemblymen, that read selling offices will be resulting and nool selling offices will be prohibited, and that a new judiciary system will be inau gurated. The sweep also means that for the first time in many years that the Re-publicans will have control of the state legislature, and at the same time have a governor in the chair in political harmon

HILL ADDITS DEFEAT EXELY. Before Eight (Petock Last Night He Had Abandoned Hope.

Athany, Nov. 7 .- As has been the cus-tom for years the state officials gathered have night in the executive chamber to read the returns from the various parts of the state. Senator Hill arrived at 7 o'clock. the state. Senator Hill arrived at 70 clock, accompanied by his private secretary and Colonel McEwan. He was the first to arrive. Colonel Williams, the governor's private secretary, came next. Already a butch of Associated Press hulletins were on Senator Hill's deck. New York county had been sending in returns since 6 o'clock, and they were not of a most favorable one sending the clock all longs of asying ture. At 7:30 o'clock all hope of saving the state was given up by those who had thus far arrived. It was even feared tha New York city might go Republican, and it was conceded that Hill would not carry the city but by a few thousand votes.

Governor Flower arrived at the executive chamber at 7:45. He was shown the the chamber at 7:46. He was shown the Associated Press dispatches and at once, gave up all hope of saving the state with the aid of New York city. He said that it seemed as if o creek tidal wave had struck the metropolts. He did not know but that it had been brought about by the po-lier investigation. He said that he folt-ber the wave seemed when he was to that the wave was coming when he was in New York in the mounting. He had hopes that the up state districts would be faith-ful to Senator Hill. All the time Senator Hill said not a word, but read the Assoclated Press returns and consulted a manual containing the votes of former years.
