REPUBLICAN CONGRESS.

Returns Indicate That Result of the Election.

CONGRESSMAN WILSON'S DEFEAT.

It is Claimed That Dayton, His Opponent, Wins by a Thousand Votes—A Republican Succeeds Congressman Breckinridge—The Re-election of Speaker Crisp.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Returns received by the Associated Press show that the next house of representatives will be Republican. The returns now show a gain for the Republicans of 58. These gains are distributed as follows: West Virginia, 3; New York, 12; Massachusetts, 4; Maryland, 3; Kentucky, 2; Pennsylvania, 6; Illinois, 3; New Jersey, 3; Connecticut, 3; Kansas, 1; Ohio, 6; Indiana, 1; North Carolina, 1; Rhode Island, 2; Michigan, 3; Colorado, 1; Wisconsin, 1; total, 56.

A dispatch from Wheeling, W. Va., says: The Republican state central committee claim that Wilson is defeated for congress by 1,000. They also claim that Huling, rep., in the Wheeling district is elected by a safe majority. Governor, rep., carries the first congressional district.

THE DEFEAT OF HILL.

Larger Than Most Sanguine Republicans Predicted.

Whether the Leader of the Boiling Democrats Gets Over Twenty Thousand Votes.

Twenty-three Republican Congressmen Elected—Strong's Big Vote for Mayor.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—The Republicans have carried New York state by estimated pluralities ranging from 10,000 to 150,000. These figures represent the probable plurality of Levi P. Morton, rep., for governor, over David B. Hill, dem., based upon the vote of New York city and Brooklyn complete and returns from more than one-half of the election districts above the Harlem river. The total vote for the two leading candidates is considerably in excess of that polled for Flower and Fassett for governor in 1891, in addition to which is the vote cast this year for Everett P. Wheeler, ind. dem., which will exceed 200,000.

The tremendous Republican sweep in the city and state, it is estimated, has elected twenty-three Republican congressmen, a gain of eight over the present representation in congress. It was the expressed belief of those who were conducting the campaign for the Democrats in the state that defeated majorities below the Harlem for the party there would be offset by increased majorities above the river's bank for the Democracy. The most sanguine expected that the Democratic party, with Senator Hill at its head, would show recuperation from the vote given for Magyard in 1893. In place of all anticipated results comes a sweep of such proportions and from every quarter beyond the highest claims made by the Republicans.

From pluralities ranging from \$5,000 to 150,000 in the district below the Harlem for the Democratic party the Republican party turns the city vote into 20,000 plurality for its state candidates. In all the Democratic estimates given on the eve of election it was contended that the Democratic plurality below the Harlem would be at least 35,000. The surprises are not confined to this change of votes, but an analysis shows that Senator Hill will run behind even the vote of Magyard, while in the state he fell below the vote cast for Governor Flower in 1891.

An analysis of such figures as are now obtainable shows that the Republican party alone gained by the increased registration, for Mr. Morton's vote in all of the up country districts show large gains over the Fassett vote of 1891. In the cities this same increase in registration appears to have been detrimental to the Democrats. The vote in Albany county was one of the many surprises of the election. For years Albany county on state or national issues has been looked upon as a reliable Democratic stronghold, good for from 1,000 to 2,000 Democratic majority. The Democratic managers, in view of this fact and that it is also the home of Senator Hill, looked for a majority of not less than 2,500. They felt confident that Senator Hill would be given a handsome vote, as Judge Magyard carried the county by a normal Democratic majority, notwithstanding the Republican trend in other portions of the state.

In Warren, with its Republican city of Rochester, the natural Republican plurality was almost doubled, his figures giving Morton 3,000, while in 1901 the same county only gave to Fassett 3,800. Rensselaer county, the home of Senator Murphy, held as closely to the Democratic vote as any in the state. The county only fell off about 800, where its neighbor, Albany county, lost at least 2,000. Erie county repeated its record of last year by giving the usual Republican majorities.

Otsego county doubled for Morton the majority it gave Harrison and trebled that it gave Fassett. Chemung held pretty closely to its normal vote, especially in Elmira City. St. Lawrence county crawled up over 2,000 on its Fassett vote, in favor of Morton. Westchester falls into line with a big majority for Morton, and Niagara county troubles its Fassett plurality. The results of the sweeping victory are more far reaching than simply the election of the Republican state ticket. While the returns are very incomplete in constitutional amendments, it is highly probable, according to the first returns, that all of them are adopted. The percentage of losses as compared with the vote for the head of the ticket is not nearly so large as it was supposed to be, and the result is, therefore, that the legislature will consist of 50 senators and 100 assemblymen, that pool-selling offices will be prohibited, and that a new judicial system will be inaugurated. The sweep also means that for the first time in many years that the Republicans will have control of the state legislature, and at the same time have a governor in the chair in political harmony with them.

HILL ADMITS DEFEAT EARLY. Before Eight O'clock Last Night He Had Abandoned Hope. ALBANY, Nov. 7.—As has been the custom for years the state officials gathered last night in the executive chamber to read the returns from the various parts of the state. Senator Hill arrived at 7 o'clock, accompanied by his private secretary and Colonel Melvonn. He was the first to arrive. Colonel Williams, the governor's private secretary, came next. Already a batch of Associated Press bulletins were on Senator Hill's desk. New York county had been sending in returns since 6 o'clock, and they were not of a most favorable nature. At 7:30 o'clock all hope of saving the state was given up by those who had thus far arrived. It was even feared that New York city might go Republican, and it was conceded that Hill would not carry the city but by a few thousand votes.

Governor Flower arrived at the executive chamber at 7:40. He was shown the Associated Press dispatches and at once gave up all hope of saving the state with the aid of New York city. He said that it seemed as if a great tidal wave had struck the metropolis. He did not know but that it had been brought about by the political investigation. He said that he felt that the wave was coming when he was in New York in the morning. He had hoped that the up side districts would be faithful to Senator Hill. All the time Senator Hill said not a word, but read the Associated Press returns and consulted a manual containing the votes of former years. As the county returns from up the state arrived he shook his head and said: "Well, they did pretty well by me."

To the consoling remarks of friends he made no reply except to smile.
