## EXECUTION OF FRANCH.

alty of His Fearful Crime.

UNREPENTANT TO THE END OF LIFE

The Man Who Threw the Bombs in the Lisee Theater, Barcelonn, Killing Twenty People and Injuring Many Others, Cursed the Priests Who Offered Consolation.

PARCELONA, Spain, Nov. 21.—Jose Salvador franch, probably the most desperate anarchist of Europe, the man who on Nov. 7. 1868, throw a dynamite bomb into the Licen theater here, killing twenty people and wounding fifty others, was executed seen after 7 o'check this morning.

Franch was taken yesterday morning to the prison chand, there to pass the last to the prison chapel, there to pass the last twenty-four hours of his life. The chapel was heavily draped with black, and lighted

Franch refused to sign his death war

rant, as the law requires, exclaiming:
"Long-live anarchy."

Upon entering the chapel Franch re-

fused to receive the priests, and to a Jesuit father who sought to administer religious consolation the anarchist exclaimed fleresly: "Get out! I was only acting. Only pretending to be religious in order to live well and hoping to get a pardon. The crime I committed was an explation due from the Bourgeoisie."

To the end be maintained the same spirit of bravado, and as he was led to his death he cursed the guards, the priests and all who came within sound of his voice. The crime for which Jose Salvadar

Franch suffered the death penalty was the most revolting of all the crimos of Eurepean anarchists. On the night of Nov. 7, 1868, while the Liceo theatre here was crowded with an audience composed mainly of the elite of the city, two bombs were thrown from the gallery into the audience beneath. One of the bombs ex-ploded with frightful force, and when the excitement had partially subsided it was discovered that twenty persons had been killed or received injuries which afterward proved fatal, while fifty others were seri-ously wounded.
