THE HAYWARD THUGS.

Rumored Existence of an Organized Gang of Murderers.

FURTHER ARRESTS ARE EXPECTED

Detectives Unearthing the Plot Which Resulted in the Murder of Pretty Catherine Ging-Another Mysterious Disappearance Charged Against Hayward.

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 13.-Harry Hayward knew Charles A. Austin, of Albany, N. Y., who arrived in Minneapolis a year ago with a certified check of \$0,000 and carried a \$3,000 life insurance. Austin was engaged to a lady at Atlanta, Ga., and Hayward accounted for Austin's absence from Minneapolis later by stating that he had gone to Atlanta to be married. Austin nau gone to Atlanta to be married. Austin never reached Atlanta, and has never been seen since. A body which was disfigured beyond identification was found in the Mississippi river a few days after Austin's disappearance, and it is now thought to have been Austin, and the theory is advanced that Hayward made away with

The statement has been made that Harry Hayward was engaged to be married to the estimable daughter of C. J. Bartleson, of this city. This story has no foundation in fact, Miss Bartleson having only a pass-

ing acquaintance with the man. The Journal says there are probably more arrests to come in the Ging case. From the first it had been regarded as well nigh incredible that Harry Hayward. used as he was to playing for high stakes a man who had often bet \$10,000 on the turn of a cord, should enter into a con-spiracy against this girl's life for a share of only \$10,000 insurance. It has been considered of paramount importance that the man who sent a note to Miss Ging on the morning of the murder, from outside the West hotel, should be identified. The fact that he has not come forward has inspired the authorities with a belief that he had an important connection with the case, and this man will have to be arrested be re the state can regard its case against

Hayward as a good one.

Hayward had a greater incentive than
has hitherto been supposed in desiring the
death of Catherine Glag. The young
woman is said on very good authority to have had five insurance policies, instead of ton, and each of them was for \$5,000. Three other persons besides Hayward were in the plan for bringing about her death, and these men have not yet been taken into

That no report has been made of the ex-Istence of other policies on Miss Ging's life is not surprising for the reason that, presuming the conspirators are afraid to demand settlement of their claims, the companies with which the insurance is placed will escape having to pay the money to the dead woman's heirs. This in itself is a sufficient reason for silence on their part, and especially as the policies were obtained in the beginning with the evi-dent intent to defraud. Blixt is probably aware of the complicity of others. It is this knowledge that he conceals and which the police have been diligently trying to squeeze out of him.

Two there sives are shadowing the sus-perted parties. None of the officials will give the slightest bint as to who these per ons are. A diligent search is going on to discover with what companies the remain ing insurance was placed, but no trace of it has been discovered. At the same time the authorities have information on which an arrest might be made at any time. The intention in holding off is to secure evi-

dence that may be used as a lever on the men when they are taken in.

Evidence is now pretty well in hand that Hayward was the local member of all insurance gang. A detective working of the case has discovered that the methods of this gang were to secure life insurance on persons who could be induced to take out heavy insurance, on the representapolicies. It would be plainly demon-strated to the insured that a profitable business could be carried on in this way.

The plan to murder Cathorine Ging was developed by four members of the gang, of which Hayward was one. These four mem were in Miss. Ging's room holding a conference with her on Sunday afternoon, the day before the murder. The men em-ployed by the insurance companies and the local authorities in honours up the

The grand jury has finished its investigations of the case, but no indicaments have yet been found.
