OPPOSING SOCIALISM

The Big Fight in the Federation of Labor Convention.

URGING COMPULSORY EDUCATION

Direct Legislation, Abolition of the Con trast System in Public Works, Municipal Ownership of Street Cars, Gas and Eloc trie Light Also Favored.

DESVER, Dec. 15 .- On the reassembling of the convention of the American Feder ation of Labor yesterilay the manner of adopting a joint label for the shoe workers was brought up, with majority and minor-ity reports. As one of the three organiza-tions uniting on the label is affiliated with the Knights of Labor the matter was de ferred until the committee on conference

A letter from Governor Waite was re prived touching on the action of Presi-dents Harrison and Cleveland in calling out the federal troops for the settling of labor and other troubles, and urging work-ingmen to unite in political action.

At 10 o'clock the "political program" which was submitted by the last conven-tion to the various unions to be acted upon by them and then by the federation was taken up. It was as follows: Whereas The trade unionists of Great

Whereas, The trade unionise of orice Britain have, by the light of experience and the legic of progress, adopted the principle of independent labor politics as an auxiliary to their economic action;

and. and, Whereas, Such action has resulted in the most gratifying success; and, Whereas, Such independent labor poll-tics are based upon the following program,

to wit: 1. Compulsory education. 2. Direct legis-lation. 3. A legal eight hour day. 4. Santary inspection of workshops, mines and homes. 5. Liability of employers for in-jury to health, body or life. 6. The aboli-tion of the contrast system in all public work. 7. The abolition of the sweating system. 8. The municipal ownership of street cars and gas and electric plants for public distribution of light, heat and power, 9. The nationalization of tele graphs, telephones, railroads and mines 10. The ownership by the people of all means of production and distribution. 11 The principle of the referendum in all

gislation. Resolved, That the convention hereby indorse the political action of our British comrades, and that this program and basis of a political labor movement be, and is hereby submitted for the consideration of the labor organizations of America, with the request that their delegates to the next annual convention of the American Federation of Labor be instructed on this mportant subject. The preamble was stigmatized by Mr

Strasser as a **bold** misrepresentation, and moved that the preamble be stricken out. It was claimed that the labor unions of England had no political organization.

John F. Tobin, one of the boot and sho workers, stirred up a storm when he as serted that there was a political organiza tion among laboring men, and that presi dents and secretaries and other officers of the labor organizations use their positions to secure political elections and appoint ment.

President Gompers took the floor and denounced as a lie the general charge which included him, and defied Mr. To bin, Mr. Morgan or any other delegate to point to a vulnerable place in his career as to honesty. He charged that it was a cow ardly, covert attack on organized labor.

After an acrimonious discussion the me tion to strike out the preamble was car ried by a vote of 1,365 to 801.

The various planks of the platform wer

then voted on separately, being adopted with the following changes: Planks 2 and 11 were consolidated, mak-ing the plank read: "Direct legislation through the referendum."

Plank 3 was amended to read: "A lega work day of not more than eight hours." Plank S was amended to include wate orks and adopted.

When the famous plank 10 came up, few minutes before i o'clock, the tug o war was reached. Mr. Strasser, of Nev Jersey, said he proposed to make the thor of that plank declare himself. H 111 He of fered as an amendment the addition o words "by means of confiscation without munitisation.



So High as in November, 1892-Business Fallarse.

NEW YORE, Dec. 15.-R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly roriew of trade says: Dun's re-riew is enabled, by the kindness of several thousand manufacturers, who have for-warded statements of their pay rolls for November this year, in 1800 and in 1802, to make a very encouraging comparison of earnings for that month, which shows an increase in total payments of 15.2 per cent, over last year, but a decrease of 18.3 per cent, in comparison with 1892. A state ment of hands employed shows that in the same establishments 10.2 per cent. mor persons were employed than a year age but 5.0 per cent. less than in 1892. Th average of carnings for over 250,000 hands is 4 per cont. larger than in 1803, but 142 per cent, less than in 1892. In some of the industries more hands are at work than in 1892, but in others the decrease is large.

Contradictory changes in business are quite in order at this season. Neither the larger orders in some branches nor the depression of prices in others afford a safe in-dication of the general movement. But the working force does not lessen more than usual for the time of year, the demand for goods does not seem to diminis' though in most departments it is consi-erably below the capacity of works in operation, and the volume of business transacted is a little larger, in comparison with here in a little larger, in comparison with last year, than in November.

The fallures for the past week have been 949 in the United States, against 330 for the same week last year, and 40 in Canada, against 40 last year.

Bradstreets' review says: There is the expected sinckening in wholesale and job-bing lines customary immediately before Christmas holidays. With few exceptions sales of Christmas specialties, notions and fancy groceries by jobbers and at retail show the only activity in the movement of merchandise, and no improvement is expocted until the next year.

The pris-oner was taken to the office of United States Commissioner Shields, who fixed his ball at $\frac{2}{2} \approx 1.000$. Efforts are being made by Mr. A. g_{eff} , its hawyer, to secure the necessary ball.


