




This dispatch calls to mind one of the most famous cases ever before the En-glish courts, that of Tichborns vs. Lushginan course, that of richborne vs. Lusa-ington, in which the plaintiff claimed the Tichborne baronetey and estates which were worth about \$150,000 a year. Roger Charles Tichborne, the rightful heir to the title and property, sailed from Havre for Valparalso in 1853, and the following year sailed for Hio Janeiro in a vessel that foundered at sea. A chancery sult was insti-tuted and his death logally proved in 1865. The claimant asserted before the courts that be and eight of the crew of the found-ered ship were saved; that he went to Australia, and lived there thirteen years under the name of Castro, but had mar-ried under the name of Tichborne. He red under the name of Inchrone. He was accepted by the downger Lady Tich-borne as her son, but the courts decided that he was an imposter. The law pro-ceedings were said to have cost the estate marks \$200,000 nearly \$460,000.

Subsequently the claimant was indicted of perjury and forgery under the name of Arthur Orton. In 1874 he was convicted and sentenced to fourteen years' impris-onment at hard labor, but in 1884 was reonment at hard halor, but in 1854 was re-leased on ticket of leave. He subsequently resided for a time in New York. He de-livered some lectures in the United States, always claiming to be the real Sir Rozer Tichborne, but public interest in the claimant had died out during his impris-ment, and the lecturing tour he had map-ped out was abandoned. He returned to England, and died in poverty several years
