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HETTY GREEN'S MILLIONS

The Rich Woman's Suit Against Her Father's Executors.

SHE DEMANDS AN ACCOUNTING.

A Secret Hearing Has Been in Progress for the Past Three Years—Mrs. Green Accuses the Executors of Gross Management.

NEW YORK, Dec. 24.—Despite her business acumen and the shrewd management of her financial affairs, Mrs. "Hetty" Green, the wealthiest woman in America, is obliged to admit that a not inconsiderable portion of her vast estate is badly entangled, and that it drifted into its involved condition utterly unknown to her.

Mrs. Green seeks to have the executors and trustees of her father's estate account for a trust fund of \$9,000,000 left by him for her benefit.

Mrs. Green, through her counsel, Lawyer William H. Stayton, of No. 45 Cedar street, alleged that there has been gross mismanagement by the executors and trustees...

It is also alleged that, although the law allows executors to expend but \$300 without vouchers, that, nevertheless, in aggregate sums not exceeding \$25,000, it is admitted that more than a hundred thousand dollars have been spent by the executors...

The testimony has thus far consisted entirely of statements and admissions made by Henry A. Barling, the only surviving executor of Edward M. Robinson, a trustee, and their accountant, Charles K. Townsend.

"Hetty" Green's father, Edward M. Robinson, died in June, 1875, leaving a fortune of about \$3,000,000, which he had accumulated through ventures in shipping and real estate.

CHICAGO, Dec. 24.—E. C. The Armenian Investigation. CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 24.—The port police has agreed to instruct the foreign delegates who will accompany the Armenian commission that they are empowered not only to suggest questions to the witnesses, but also to personally examine them.

To Prosecute Oligomargarine Dealers. TUXEON, Dec. 24.—Since the recent United States circuit court decision concerning the sale of oligomargarine the big western dealers in that commodity have made the sale of their adulterating mixture "Sole Dairy" a business.

Hayward to be Tried Next Month. MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 24.—Harry Hayward, accused of murdering the aristocrat Catherine Greig, Dec. 1, was arraigned in the district court on the charge of murder the first of December. He pleaded not guilty, and his case was set for Jan. 21.

Murderer Walters Acquitted. READING, Pa., Dec. 24.—The jury in the Walters wife murder case rendered a verdict of not guilty, and the prisoner was at once discharged. This seemed a considerable surprise, as it was supposed that the prisoner would at least be convicted of a lower grade of homicide.

Ten Years for a Train Robber. HELENA, Mont., Dec. 24.—Charles Jones, train robber, has been sentenced to ten years imprisonment. Jones and three other men held up a Northern Pacific train at Grey Cliff in western Montana, in August, 1904.

Blew Off the Side of His Face. GLASSBORO, N. J., Dec. 24.—While handling a gun, William Carstrom, employed by Preston Dicks, was severely injured. The original wound in some manner became infected, and the result was a fatal infection.

Lambert Prepared for Death. CAMDEN, N. J., Dec. 24.—Refusing to regard Theodore Lambert, the homeless slayer of the saintly priest, as legally dead, Justice Charles G. Smith declined to grant the writ of habeas corpus.

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A RACE WAR IMMINENT

QUITMAN, Ga., Dec. 24.—With seven negroes dead and injured, and a number of whites in near proximity to a riot, a situation of the most serious nature is existing in this county. The negroes are the result of the murder of Mr. Joseph Isom, one of the most substantial farmers of Brooks county.

Mexicans Deserting Their Farms. OAKLAND, Mex., Dec. 24.—A courier from the Guatemalan border reports that there is such a disturbed condition of affairs on the frontier that the army and ranches are being abandoned, and the people are seeking places of safety from the depredation and crimes that are being constantly committed by the bandits and outlaws who follow in the wake of the soldiers.

British Warships at Acapulco. ACAPULCO, Dec. 24.—The extended stay in this harbor of the English cruisers Royal Arthur, Champion, Satellite and Nymphe is a matter of much speculation as to the plans of England's warships in this part of the Pacific.

A Lineman Probably Murdered. STERLING, N. Y., Dec. 24.—The body of Matthew Fulton, a lineman in the employ of the Central New York Telephone and Telegraph company, was found early in the morning beside the tracks of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railroad.

General Plume Exonerated. TRENTON, Dec. 24.—A report of the military court of inquiry appointed several months ago to investigate the action of Major General Plume, of the National Guard of New Jersey, in reorganizing the First brigade and disbarring Companies G, H, I, K and L of the Fourth regiment, has been filed in a full exoneration.

Cured by a Bull. TAMAUCA, Pa., Dec. 24.—While Farmer Lewis Bowman, of Barnesville, was administering a dose of medicine to a sick cow he was suddenly attacked by a vicious bull. Mr. Bowman was terribly gored by the animal and but for the timely appearance of Albert Keyser he would have been killed.

Charges Against Fellows Dismissed. ALBANY, Dec. 24.—Governor Flower, in dismissing the charges of neglect of duty against District Attorney Fellows, of New York, declared that the charges "is not only wholly unproved but is actually disproved by the evidence, and no criticism deserving consideration, of the competency, industry or integrity of his assistants, has been made."

Highwayman's Assault Proves Fatal. SYRACUSE, N. Y., Dec. 24.—A special from Homer says: On Friday evening Patrick Quinlan, 50 years old, who lives near this place, was assaulted and robbed while on his way home, and he died at 9 o'clock last evening.

Fatally Shot While Resisting Arrest. WILKESBARRE, Pa., Dec. 24.—A man named Brown, who lived in Pittston, was fatally shot by Policeman Gallagher, of this city, last night while resisting arrest.

NUGGETS OF NEWS. In a race riot at Pineapple, near Selma, Ala., three men were killed. In a railway collision at Chelford, England, thirteen persons were killed and twenty injured.

Emile J. Nossek was kicked to death at Detroit last night by five drunken men. The assault was unprovoked. The French band of outlaws raided the town of Nowata, I. T., secured \$190 from the railroad station, and rode off.

Eleven houses were cremated in an incendiary fire which destroyed the barns of Thomas Bard, at Geneva, N. Y., last night. A burning steam pipe in a sugar refinery at Franklin, La., killed August Broder, aged 60, and Joseph Castillo, aged 20 years.
