THE STORM IN EUROPE.

Great Damage and Loss of Life in the Dutch Coast.

PROBABLY A HUNDRED PERISHED.

WOMEN TROUBLED IN COREA.

A High Official Involved in Intrigue Against Japan. ENCOURAGED TONG HAK REBELS. Secret Dispatches Sent to Chinese Generals Fall Into Japanese Hands—Losses of the Armies of China and Japan from a Japanese Standpoint.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Recent newspaper mail advices received here from Japan show that the question of the terms of peace with Japan will demand from China a fruitful subject of discussion by the native press. Opinions, however, differ regarding these terms, and while some journals content themselves with speaking generally on the subject, others are more specific in their demands. One paper asserts that for a military so important of view, must at all events be taken. Another paper enters a strong protest against the claims that China must surrender territory entirely out of proportion to the objects for which the war was undertaken. Assuming that the war is practically over, the Japanese are already discussing the matter of Japan's prospects there. Mr. Kaoko, the vice minister of state for agriculture and commerce, has been looking into the history of the United States after the great civil war, and to that of Germany after the Franco-Prussian war for light on the subject, and the minister has been holding consultations about the matter for some time, but the investigations are far from concluded. The vice minister is personally of the opinion that the extension of facilities for direct exportation is of the greatest importance.

According to a Seoul correspondent advices are again becoming serious in Corea, where there is trouble in which Tai Won Kim, who is understood here to be probably prime minister, is involved. He had his origin in the surrender of Li Honk, a favorite of Tai Won Kim, to the Korean police, in whose custody he is now held. It appears, too, that in all the deliberations of the faction headed by the aged statesman, and is therefore acquainted with its secrets. Consensus finally drove him to confess to the police.

Letters by means of which the faction investigated the Tong Hak insurgents, together with other documents bearing on the same point, and secret dispatches sent by the Tai Won Kim to the Chinese generals in the hands of the Japanese authorities, and the master project of the old gentleman and his followers against Japan, the correspondent adds, is now an open secret.

Since these events transpired news has come to the United States by telegraph to the effect that the Japanese government has 'dispensed' with the services of Tai Won Kim, and the natural presumption is that the action was the result of the occurrences referred to.

A Japanese paper gives a summary of the losses of the Japanese and Chinese armies up to Nov. 25, exclusively of the battles at Ping Wan Chang, Kueinan, Tai-han and Port Arthur. It shows that the Japanese lost about 100 killed and 825 wounded, while the Chinese lost 4,500 men killed and 4,500 wounded, and 1,018 of them were made captives, making a total of 10,318. The Chinese have also had 21 cannon taken from them, 4,850 rifles, 30,384 cannon shot and 60,000 cartridges.

Besides enough ammunition to last a month, being worth 30,000 rifles, 334 banners have been taken, 3,000 tents, 1,000 horses, 3,000,000 taels worth of gold and silver, 11,000 coils, 2,413 coils of rice, 6,753 coils of unspun rice, and in addition sufficient food to last an army of 20,000 men three days. The Chinese have also lost thirteen vessels, a torpedo boat, five men-of-war sunk, and one of their war vessels captured, which makes a total tonnage of 9,800 tons.

The number of killed and wounded on the Japanese side at Port Arthur is estimated at 100, while the loss of the enemy is estimated at nine times that number.

MORE CHINESE DEFEATS.

A Fierce Hand to Hand Battle with the Usual Result.

YOKOHAMA, Dec. 21.—General Kasatra, on Dec. 19, attacked General Lung's position seven miles west of Hant Ching. The position was defended by 10,000 Chinese, who were routed after four assaults. The fighting lasted five hours. The Japanese are now about ten miles from New Ching, which it was expected would be reached today.

A dispatch from Antong says that the Japanese force consisted of four regiments of infantry and two batteries of artillery. The latter bombarded the Chinese, who had established themselves in the village of King Wai. The infantry then attacked through the Chinese lines. The fighting was stubborn, the combatants meeting hand to hand. The fight was the fiercest that has yet taken place. The Chinese loss is estimated at 600 killed or severely wounded. The Japanese also suffered severely.

A dispatch from Kobe, Japan, says that thousands of Tonghaks defeated the Korean garrison of 300 soldiers at Challo, and then burned the houses. The inhabitants of the town fled. It is reported that a number of Chinese were among the Tonghaks.

Married on His Deathbed.

CHICAGO, Dec. 21.—A. P. Halise, chief clerk of the Elgin, Joliet and Eastern railroad, died at the Wellington hotel yesterday afternoon of aneurism of the heart. A sad feature of the demise was the death-bed marriage of the deceased to Miss Olive Hopewell, of St. Louis. Their wedding had been arranged for Jan. 1, but realizing Mr. Halise could not survive the nuptials were hastened.

Death Rather Than Blindness.

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—Despondency caused by approaching blindness caused Jacob F. D. Sells, a lawyer, to commit suicide yesterday. He shot himself through the heart. Mr. Sells was 48 years of age, and lived at a boarding house in Madison avenue.

A Kentucky Desperado Killed.

DANVILLE, Ky., Dec. 21.—Mikajah Rowsey, the desperado, was killed at Junction City Saturday night while resisting arrest by Town Marshal Ellis. Rowsey is the last of a family of seven sons who met death with their boots on.

No Case Against District Attorney Kelly.

ALBANY, Dec. 21.—Governor Flower gave out his findings in the matter of the charges against District Attorney Kelly, of Rensselaer. The charges are dismissed as not substantiated.
