# No Settlement as Tet Between the

Two Republica.

Any Interference by Foreign Governments Will be Resented as an Act of Unfriendliness to Mexico-Guatemala's Minister at Washington Hopeful of Peace.

CITY OF MEXICO, Feb. 2.-Mexico is still sending troops to the front. From general gossip it looks as though President Diaz may be handicapped by his cabinet on account of finance, but Guatemala as far as can be learned here, still stands on her or-iginal proposition. Mexico has so far ap-parently ignored clause 4 of the treaty of 1888, calling for arbitration, consequently Guatemala and the other members of the reputed federation of Central American republics ignore the treaty of 1887. Guate-mala has between 10,000 and 12,000 troops now on the frontier.

Among the various foreign legations here the sentiment seems unanimous that Mexico's policy is justifiable and the opin ion also seems to prevail that unless Guat emala recedes there will be declaration of war. Any outside interference will undoubtedly be resented as an act of un-friendliness by the Mexican people.

Mexico has maintained that its question with Guatemala is not one for submission to arbitration, and there is not the slight est reason to suppose it has changed its position in this respect. The intervention of a South American government, which has also been announced by sensational correspondents, would not be any more acceptable to the Mexican people than that of the United States, a rumor of which certainly caused a very disagreeable impression in this country.

Senor Arriaga Confident of Peace.

Washington, Feb. 2.—Senor Arriaga, the Guatemalan minister, called at the state department yesterday, but owing to the meeting of the cabinet he was unable to see Secretary Gresham personally. He appears to be confident of the ultimate success of the peace negotiations. It is believed here that there is little danger of any sudden declaration of war, even in the event of the failure of the efforts of the two governments to settle their troubles ceably, for the Mexican constitution, like our own, places in the power of the congress alone the authority to make such a declaration.

The Alliance Against Mexico Denied. GUATEMALA, Feb. 2 .- It is stated now that there will be no collusion between the several Central American states eral indignation over the arrest, a against Mexico. Last October a meeting not believed to be at all implicated. was held at which representatives were present from Honduras, Nicaragua, Salvador and Costa Rica, agitating the question, but no definite stops have been taken yet to formulate and cement such an alliance.

#### A Divorced Wife's Victory.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 2.—George E. White, known as the cattle king of Mendocino county, was yesterday ordered by the superior court to pay his divorced wife \$100,000 for her separate estate. The di-vorce case has been continually in the courts during the past ten years. White, who was a reputed millionaire, applied for a divorce on statutory grounds in 1885. As no evidence was produced in substantiation of White's allegation the divorce was awarded to Mrs. White, and the cattle king directed to pay her alimony of \$200 monthly. By secreting and disposing of his property and pleading poverty White has evaded payment of this monthly al-lowance. The court, tired of White's trif ling, ordered the payment of the lump sum as a final settlement.

The governor called in Sir William White-way, who will undertake the formation of a ministry. This is the fourth government hore within a year. The Nurse Who Met Death Rather Than Desert Her Patient.

FOUR DEAD IN A HOSPITAL FIRE.

Miss Baumer, the Heroic Nurse, Might Easily Have Saved Her Own Life, but the Noble Woman, Though Urged by Firemen, Refused to Make the Effort.

CLEVELAND, Feb. 2.-A frail wooden dwelling house, occupied as a hospital, taught fire yesterday, and almost before the terrible situation could be realized four lives were destroyed by the flames. It was the Deaconess hospital, a branch of the Christian Institute, of Chicago, estab-lished last October in a two and a half story house on Jennings avenue. In it were twelve patients, four nurses and four laundry girls.

The fire started in the basement, pre sumably from the furnace, and before it could be extinguished four of the fifteen patients in the house and hospital were dead and the building almost entirely de stroyed. Brave work on the part of the firemen and police alone prevented a fur-

By desperate efforts the patients on the first and second floors were saved, though some of them may die of the exposure, but every person in the low garret, reached only by a steep, narrow stairway, met a

horrible death. Before the fire department had arrived. and before the flames had reached the out-side of the building. Nurse Minnie Baumer appeared at the up stairs window and implored those below to assist her in getting out her patient, who was Samuel Almyer. All saw that it would be folly to attempt to enter the building, which

was now burning fiercely. 'Jump to the porch and save yourself.' cried the firemen to her, as she was but fifteen or sixteen feet above the broad veranda roof.

'I can't leave my patient," was the reply of the brave woman as she turned to look back into the room, evidently to quiet the fears of Almyer, who thought she was going to leave him.

For a moment the brave woman stood looking down into the crowd below her, and then duty triumphed over her desire to be saved. The smoke was pouring from the windows about her and her white, startled face appeared as a picture in a frame of darkest ebony. Then she turned into the room, and she was seen no more until her blackened form was carried tenderly from the building shortly after

Four men were taken from the burning ing before they had been consumed by the

Jacob Krause was found at the foot of the stairs leading to the third floor. He had been suffering from a fractured skull and was suffocated. William Almyer was suffering from a broken hip, and was also suffocated. Minnie Baumer, the nurse who had remained to guard him, was found terribly burned at the foot of the bed. In an adjoining room was found the body of a young child, 8 months old. It had been suffocated.

The dead are: Jacob Krause, carpenter, 60 years old; Samuel Almyer, widower, 59 years old; Walter Clark, a foundling, 8 months old; Minnie Baumer, nurse, 22
